

BIKE RACES AT THE SAUCER LAST NIGHT

While last night's program of bike races at the saucer track was not the very best provided this season by Manager Harry Hargren, it was a pretty good one, and it was the journey down to the salt dome.

There were some interesting features, especially in the two-mile professional lap race, in which Samuelson and Lawson again broke up a hard combination by their remarkable speed and endurance. Last evening they secured the services of Hollister and Bowler to assist them in shutting out the speedy pair. All riders took alike to the track and the result of the race was the same as the others, that is, the fast team carried off the money.

The combination did succeed in pocketing Samuelson. Toward the last, Hollister made his famous jump, followed by Hollister. Samuelson was in a pocket, but quick as a flash Lawson jumped out and hung to Hollister's rear wheel. Judge W. J. Calhoun Appointed Special Commissioner.

Oyster Bay, July 11.—Judge William J. Calhoun of Chicago has been appointed by President Roosevelt to be a special commissioner to Venezuela. Judge Calhoun will make a thorough investigation into the conditions in Venezuela so far as they relate to the United States and its interests.

The following official announcement was made: The president has appointed Mr. W. J. Calhoun of Chicago, special commissioner to Venezuela. The president has also known of his work as interstate commerce commissioner. He also has been designated as special commissioner to examine fully into the situation in Venezuela and report to the president what the differences are between Venezuela and other foreign powers, and also as to what has been arranged for other powers which in any way conflicts with the interests of the United States.

He is also to examine into the complaint made by American companies as to the conduct of Venezuela and report to the president exactly as to what the equities are in these cases. Judge Calhoun will make no inquiries relating to the Boven-Loomis case. The president regards that as practically a closed incident. Judge Calhoun visited the president about 10 days ago. The president at that time tendered him this appointment, and shortly afterward he indicated his acceptance.

His mission is in a nature confidential, and his report on it will be made directly to the president. What disposition the president will make of the report is not known. He may authorize its publication, but the probability is that he will treat it as President McKinley treated that of Judge Calhoun on Cuba.

NO REALLY BAD BOYS.

Dr. Ames Barlow Makes That Statement.

St. Paul, July 11.—The interesting statement that there are no really bad boys, but that "some boys are misunderstood," was made by Dr. Ames Barlow of the National Children's Home society. State aid for the work of the society caused considerable discussion. Reporting for Kansas, Supp. Morris said the society had declined state appropriations because it would not submit to a state inspection.

Gov. Otero's Son.

Ex-Convicts Plotted to Kidnap and Hold Him for Ransom.

Denver, Colo., July 11.—A News special from Santa Fe, N. M. says: A plot to kidnap Gov. Otero's son has just been exposed. Eight ex-convicts are said to have formed themselves into a band to carry out the plot. The plan was to kidnap the governor's son and carry him into the wilds of the Malpais country in Lincoln county, where he was to be held for ransom. The gang, after reaching the Malpais intended to inform the governor that they had his son, and would deposit him at a certain place an enormous sum of money.

Reports from other states showed that the work was making favorable progress.

VICTORY FOR DOWIE.

Has All Bankruptcy Proceedings Against Him Dismissed.

Chicago, July 11.—John Alexander Dowie today had all bankruptcy proceedings against him dismissed by Judge Belton because none of the petitioning creditors have complied with the court's order to file a statement of assets. According to Dowie's attorney's all of the claims mentioned in the original petition, amounting to something like \$400,000, have been substantially paid off with interest. More than a year ago a hair has been consumed in the controversy.

A HITCH IN REFORM.

Mayor Weaver's Counsel and District Attorney Disagree.

A RUSSIAN WRITER ABUSES UNITED STATES.

St. Petersburg, July 11.—The papers here generally consider that France's amicable agreement with Germany on the subject of Morocco was wise, considering that France instead of suffering serious distinct recognition by Germany of her interests in Morocco. The Novoye Vremya considers that the situation between the two countries was not dissimilar to the situation which existed between Russia and Japan before the war and commends France's prompt appreciation of her indefensible position.

"France," the paper says, "did not hesitate to remove the minister who was dragging the country into war."

M. Vandam, a writer on the staff of the Novoye Vremya, is publishing a series of articles dealing with the United States, attempting to show that the United States is Russia's real enemy, that Japan is her puppet, and that a great mistake was made when Russia refused to negotiate with the United States in Washington. "Where the American government can pull the strings," the articles display gross ignorance of many momentary facts and it is pointed out that such publications unfortunately are creating a false impression of the United States role.
