Utah County Jury Took Whitecotton At His Word.

London, May 2.—Gen. Botha, premier of the Transvaal, sprang a surprise at the imperial conference today by the declaration that he was uccompromis-ingly opposed to a commercial confer-ence within the empire. It was general-ly supposed he would agree with Alfred Deakin, whose views already had been strongly endorsed by Sir Joseph Ward. Frederick R. Moor and Dr. Jameson, respectively premiers of New Zealand, Natal and Cape Colony. Gen. Botha declared it would be quite competent for his government to raise tariffs against British goods or against those of other countries if that policy commended itself. He protested against any attempt to rob the respective gov-ernments of their freedom in tariff mat-ters. Special Correspondence. Provo, May 3.—The jury in the case of A. F. Acord vs A. L. MRS. SINGER3-BIGGER

Reaches Settlement of Long Pending Suit Against the McCourts.

Suit Against the McCourts. Denver, May 3.—After a legal battle which has been waged in the federal courts since 1991, Marie Antionette Sin-gers-Bigger, now of London, has reached a settlement with Mr. and Mrs. Peter McCourt, against whom she brought suit to recover for the profits due her as the heir of her father, Wil-liam H. Bush, who, with the McCourts, at one time controlled the Broadway and Tabor theaters in this city. In the federal court yesterday Judge Lewis permitted the payment by the McCourts to the plaintiff in the sum of \$47,100 in final settlement of all claims. The to-tal amount recovered by Mrs. Singers-Bigger is said to be in the neighbor-hood of \$100,000. When the suit was filed in 1901, it caused a mild sensation because of the charges which were made in the court. The McCourts who had beeu the part-ners of Bush of an amusement com-pany, were accused of trying to de-prive his estate of the Interest it heid, together with the profits which had accrued, through the organization of another company, in which the Bush interests were left out in the cold.
