

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

FIFTEENTH WARD FEMALE RELIEF SOCIETY.

This afternoon the members of the Female Relief Society of the 15th Ward, held a meeting in the 15th Ward School House. President Young had been invited by the ladies of the Society to meet with an address on matters pertaining to the objects for which the Society was organized, and as an invitation to attend the meeting had been extended to the members of the Relief Societies of the other Wards in the City and the Settlements contiguous to the meeting was well attended. On the stand were President Young, Elder F. D. Richards, President Joseph Young and Bishop R. T. Burton.

The first business done after the meeting was opened, was the reading of the statistical and financial reports of the society by its Secretary and Treasurer. The reports were of a very satisfactory character most conclusively evincing that the members of the 15th Ward Female Relief Society have been energetic and persevering, and that their labors in relieving the sick and administering to the wants of the necessitous, have been eminently successful.

After the reading of the reports President Young delivered a highly interesting address to the Society upon the important duties devolving upon them as members thereof; also explaining the true object of their creation and the best way to subserve the designs of their being and to fill properly the various relations they are called upon to assume, as daughters, wives and mothers, while passing through this mortal life. The address was reported and will appear in the columns of the News at an early date.

President Joseph Young, then, followed and spoke a short time upon the importance of carrying out the instructions given by the President, and of living at all times so as to enjoy the spirit of God and in accordance with the precepts of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Elder F. D. Richards congratulated the Society upon its very flattering condition, and besought the members of other Wards present, to take the instructions to their several Wards. He impressed upon the Sisters the great necessity of observing all the instructions given, especially in relation to the care and training of their children.

Sister E. R. Snow made a few remarks. She congratulated the President and members of the Society upon the success of their labors, and prayed that their prosperity might continue and that they might enjoy the aid and guidance of the Spirit of God in their labors.

Bishop R. T. Burton next addressed the meeting for a short time, endorsing and urging the importance of observing the instructions given by the preceding speakers.

He left Elder Jesse W. Crosby in Georgia. Elder Hayden W. Church had been quite sick but was recovered. The brethren on missions east, so far as he was acquainted, were in good health. Bro. Smoot is enjoying excellent health and spirits.
