A case of garnishment of a teacher's salary occurred yesterday under the new law permitting the garnishment of salaries of officials.

The officers of the board of education and the janitors of the schools were paid their regular monthly salaries today by Clerk Judd. The total amount of the payroll is \$2,645.

**SAM GRICE AGAIN.**

This Time the Charge of Burglary Will be Pressed Against Him.

The police are elated this morning because they firmly believe they have Sam Grice, the notorious burglar, this time. They have found him this time on the charge of burglary. Many, many times, Sam has been arrested on various charges, and many times he has been found even to the district court, but he always managed to get out on some technicality in the complaints.

But this time, says the police, he will be caught for sure.

Last night, two places were burglarized. The first was the fruit stand owned by Felice Chiarella, 419 west Second South, from which place \$15 worth of plug tobacco was stolen. The next place broken into was the Western Produce, but just across the street. Two boxes of oranges were stolen and the old machine was broken open and the contents stolen.

This morning Detective Chase and Holt found Sam Grice trying to dispose of the stolen property. Sam was in the vicinity of the crime last night and these facts coupled with the fact that he is unable to account for his whereabouts at the time the offense were committed, lead the police to believe that this time they have a good case against Sam. He is now in the city jail on the charge of burglary and a complaint will be filed this afternoon. He will be arraigned on Monday morning.
