THE GEORGIA EXCUBIT BY A MULLATO FALSE PROPHECY.

The news comes from Galncsville, Ga., that Madison, Jackson and Mel-

This man is described as a mulatto with tall, not unpleasant looking, with a serious cast of countenance, and having an agreeable voice. He is said to be most truly eloquent, and his language—much of which is Biblical—is Oriental in the luxury of its imagery. Yet he uses also homely images, and chains the attention of his audience by his perfect familiarity with

and negro life. He is well informed, fairly educated, and his manner is pleasant and unobtrusively repellent. So remarkable is his influence that his his followers actually fall in with him, and he is able to lead him and he accepts such homage as his justly earned. He is a man of great power to be the Messiah, whose coming has been foretold from the beginning. His deluded followers have eagerly asserted that he is the Messiah, the Son of the veritable Christ. There are, indeed, many who are ready to acknowledge his authority for his mission. He exhibits a certain amount of the prophetic *stigmata*; they are in his hands and feet, with the mark of a spear wound in his side. It may be imagined how such a man, with such a mission, would attract superstitious blacks, already prepared to believe in the supernatural. His ministrations, given in the silent watches of the night, in the midst of the gloomy darkness of the forest, and under the fitful glare of pitch-pine knots blazing in the hands of stalwart negroes, would certainly attract a large audience. The scene at one of these secret meetings is said to be exciting and impressive. He is able to induce his hearers to establish in the minds of the negroes a firm conviction that he is the Messiah, a firm conviction that he is what he announces himself to be, a gentleman who has visited the haunts of the poor, and who has been able to see that he has forgiven the sins of a large number of the negroes who have applied to him.

his new dispensation of black-and-tan proselytism it is difficult to foretell. Their new leader may incite the blacks to outrage and rapine, he may organize them into a compact body which will have strength enough to terrorize the south. Or he may fall a victim to those who, awakened from their delusion, may possibly be roused to just anger against the one who has deceived them. It is in one sense a sign of advancement that the negroes should produce a man with the ingenuity to devise and the courage to execute a plan of action offering so many difficulties and dangers.

Overture have the blacks anywhere on this hemisphere produced a leader. In Africa, King Celewango and King Mbuli have exhibited some of the qualities of the American negro. During years of slavery they were the strongest and bravest of him of his ancient country, until he was awakened in him new powers and new reasons for exerting them.
