LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Exciting Election.—The following special to the News arrived at 9:30 a. m. to-day:

PRISKO, June 7, 1931.

Exciting school elections here yesterday. Town divided, two parties have been voting 10 days; 500 votes polled. The regular ticket won by three votes over the people's ticket. Forty buggies were running all day. Williams and Morhouse were elected. The polls opened at nine a. m. and closed at seven p. m.

Familiarity.—A large bull walked up to the door of Gardner's restaurant, about noon to-day, but before he had time to order his meal the proprietor met him in the doorway and requested him to move on. His bovinehip then walked up the sidewalk a little way, and entered the establishment of Little and Roundy, thus newly and literally illustrating the maxim of "a bull in a china shop." He stood gazing around upon the glassware for a few moments, quite leisurely, and then turned around and calmly walked out. He was not asked to call again.

Returned.—Elder Wm. Henry Adams, of Fountain Green, returned last evening from a mission to the Southern States, whither he went last October, having been called at the General Conference held that month. From here he proceeded to Georgia, where he labored, principally, during his absence. He baptized nine persons and assisted in the baptism of two others, and with his brethren, organized a branch of eleven members including a Sabbath School. He traveled most of the time with Elder T. W. Howard, who returned last March, to Utah. He then labored alone for two months, and was released on the 2nd of May to return home, on account of ill health. Previous to leaving the State of Georgia, he visited the branch in White County, where Elder Jos. B. Keeler is laboring, and found the work prospering generally in that region. He met with considerable bitter opposition, and also with much kindness, and left matters in a good condition, with a fair outlook for the future. He will leave for home to-morrow, visiting friends by the way, and expects to reach Fountain Green in about a week.

A Good Man Gone.—Elder Henry Emery, First Counselor to Bishop Frederick Kesler, of the 16th Ward, and a man well beloved by all who had his acquaintance, died on Saturday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock, at his residence in the above named Ward. For several years he had been a sufferer from a cancer which formed upon his nether lip, and afflicted him so seriously that it was found necessary to remove it, which was accordingly done. It was hoped that after this operation he would find relief, but the same trouble soon re-appeared in his left cheek, and gradually descended to his throat, where it affected him so severely that he could scarcely swallow his food. For the last eight months he has been confined to his house, eating scarcely enough to sustain life, and gradually wasted away until death put an end to his sufferings.

His funeral was held yesterday, at 10 a. m., in the 16th Ward Meeting House, where the large assemblage of relatives and friends of the deceased were addressed, in turn, by Bishop F. Kesler, President Joseph F. Smith and President George Q. Cannon. The remains were consigned to a grave in the City Cemetery.

Brother Emery's memory will live long in the heart of thousands, who knew him for an honest, upright, God-fearing man, a good husband, a kind father, and a peaceable, industrious and useful citizen. He died as he had lived, firm in the faith of the everlasting gospel, and after a life of honor and usefulness on earth, has gone to receive a glorious reward in the eternal realm where the righteous dwell forever.

School Elections.—Pursuant to announcement, meetings were held in the various school districts, last evening, each for the purpose of electing a school trustee for the term of three years, and to transact such other business as would properly come before the meeting.

In the First District, Thomas Jack was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of John Skidaway.

In the Second District, William Wheeler was elected.

In the Third District, T. F. H. Morton was chosen to fill the vacancy left by John Y. Smith, and T. O. Angell and John Y. Smith were chosen in place of Thos. Maycock and J. W. Eardley, absent from the Territory.

In the Fourth District, M. Christofferson was re-elected.

In the Fifth District, Edwin Pettit was chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the expired term of Richard Brimley.

In the Sixth District, James Poulton was elected to fill the regular vacancy, and Eugene B. Fulmer, to take the place of Alex. Burt, absent in Europe.

In the 7th District, David McKenzie was elected his own successor.

In the Eighth District, Jas. Sheldermine was elected to fill the regular vacancy.

In the Ninth District, C. W. Penrose was elected. The vote was the largest ever polled in the District.

In the Tenth District, Oliver Hodgson was elected to the office left vacant by James Harvey, whose term had expired.

In the Eleventh District, Robert Morris succeeded Francis Armstrong.

In the Twelfth District, Henry McEwan was re-elected.

In the Thirteenth District, Wm. Taylor was elected.

In the Fourteenth District, Thos. Taylor was re-elected.

In the Fifteenth District, John C. Cutler was chosen to succeed J. W. Ure. The vote was unanimous. It was decided to make certain improvements on the school property at an early day.

In the Sixteenth District, Joseph W. Summerhays was elected by a unanimous vote of 50. The reports showed several hundred dollars worth of improvements made, \$800 of debts paid, and the District free from indebtedness.

In the Seventeenth District, Wm. B. Douglass was chosen to fill the vacancy left by John H. Smith.

In the Eighteenth District, Wm. B. Barton was elected unanimously. He succeeds John T. Chalm. The building of a new schoolhouse was adopted as the sense of the meeting.

In the Nineteenth District, Henry Arnold was re-elected.

In the Twentieth District, B. Y. Hampton was chosen to succeed Alfred Ison.

In the Fifty-first District (21st Ward), Thomas Goodman was elected to fill the regular vacancy, and Joseph Barker was elected to fill the unexpired term of two years occasioned by the resignation of Robert Aveson.

Some of the meetings were quite well attended; at others the attendance was very poor. Good order prevailed at most of them. At one or two places, however, the vote was divided and the contest somewhat spirited.

When they were not laughing boisterously, they were either smiling broadly, or clapping their hands with rapturous delight. Nearly every song was encored repeatedly. The entire thing went off with that spirit and smoothness which stamps the artistic performance universally. All who go to-night when "Dreams" is repeated will enjoy a treat seldom afforded.
