We are proud of our schools, our churches, our business houses, our fertile farms, and last, but not least, of one of the best water works systems in the state, with as pure water as can be found anywhere in the world.

It used to be if you want good beer and plenty of it go to Spanish Fork. Now we say, if you want good water and plenty of it, "Come to Spanish Fork."

We are proud of our water works system. It is a credit to the town. For years it had been in the dreams of the people. Now the dreams have been realized. It cost money well spent, costing approximately \$15,000. The water is piped from the mouth of Spanish Fork canyon, from what is known as the Evans Spring, about five miles east of here. It is exceptionally pure, having been analyzed and pronounced such by the leading chemists of the state. There is sufficient water to supply a city with double the population. The spring is cemented on all sides, and over it is erected a frame building, so the water is absolutely safe from any contamination. Directly from the spring for about a mile and a half, 12-inch steel pipe has been used, but from this point wooden stave pipe is used, securely bound by iron bands that have been thoroughly dipped in asphalt. Ten, eight and six-inch pipe has been used, with a continuous increase in bands as the force of the water increased, so that in the center of town six bands have been used to the foot, forming a net work of bands, making the pipe absolutely secure. The force of the water at this point is from 30 to 90 pounds per square inch.

There are three mains—one on Sixth East, one on Third East, and the other on Main street. It is from these mains that the water is being distributed to all parts by means of three-inch galvanized pipe. For service pipe 1/2-inch galvanized pipe is used. When completed the water will form a circuit, all mains and laterals being connected. Fire hydrants have been placed along all mains, affording ample fire protection.

The city has its own fire department, and is now negotiating for an electric light system, which will undoubtedly be successful.

The year 1904 marks a new epoch in the history of Spanish Fork, with a good water works system nearly completed, reducing sickness, fire loss, and insurance rates to a minimum.

A new saw factory put into motion bringing increased trade and labor; electric light system launched, and about ready for construction work.

A great revival in building, farmers rejoicing because of an abundant harvest, and the merchants doing a greatly increased business.

We are proud of the improvements and progress made in 1904. We are re-doing our energies, working diligently, living frugally, and going forward to meet the new year with increased hopes and confidence.

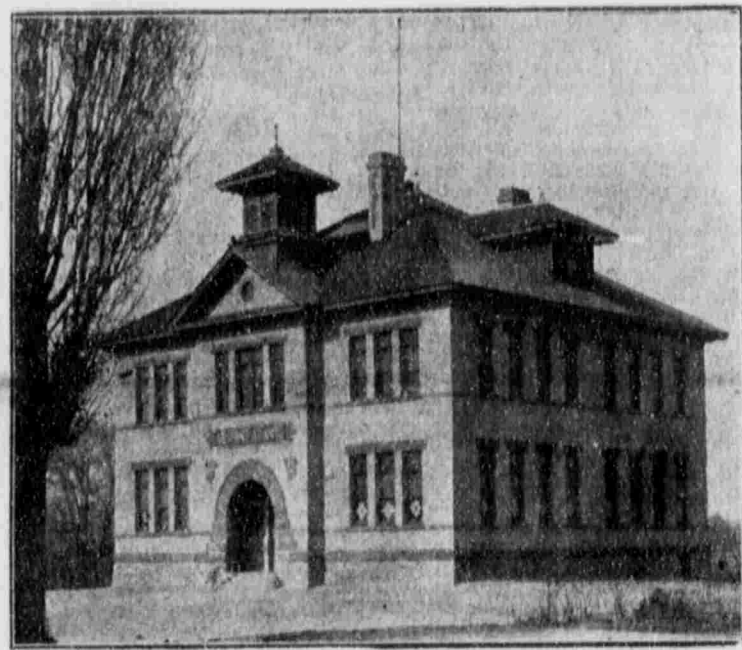
prising business man, and by good business methods has secured a liberal patronage.

HOW TO MAKE VIRGINIA PLUM PUDDING.

The following is a good recipe for Old Virginia plum pudding: Ten eggs, three-quarters of a pound of beef suet, one and a quarter pounds of raisins, one pound of dried currants or cherries, one pint of milk, one pound of citron cut in thin slices. Mix the flour and suet together and rub the fruit all so in a little flour. Beat the eggs very light, leaving out the whites of five, and add all the ingredients together. If thicker than cup cake batter, add a little more milk. Then add a teaspoonful of ground ginger, one of powdered cin-

amon, one of powdered cloves, two nutmegs, the grated rind of a lemon, one wineglassful of wine, one of brandy, a little powdered meat and one pint of bread crumbs. Scald your pudding bag thoroughly, rub well inside with flour, leave plenty of room inside for the pudding to swell and stop the opening with dough. Let the water be boiling and boil steadily for four hours. When ready to serve pour brandy over the whole and send to the table ablaze.

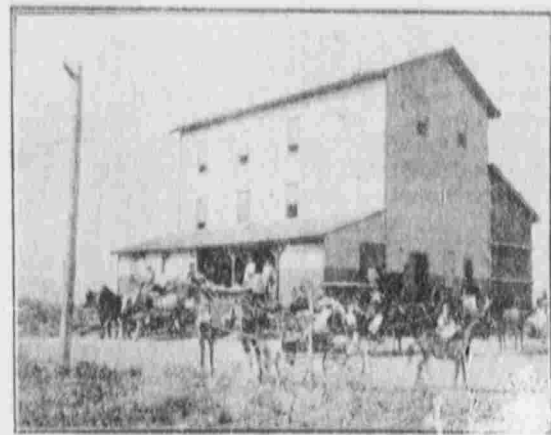
