# EDITORIAL CORRESPONDENCE.

PRESIDENT YOUNG'S TRIP SOUTH. NEPHI, Sept. 20, 1868.

Our last letter terminated rather abruptly. Before we had finished we accidentally snuffed the candle out, and as everybody was in bed and we could find no matches we were under the necessity of breaking off. Payson possesses a rare postmaster in the person of Bro. John T. Hardy; he is a model officer, and discharges the duties of his position with fidelity and ability. We had heard his good qualities spoken of and we had an opportunity of testing them, we were under the necessity of awakening him to write the last line or two of our letter, and to direct and post it. The alacrity and pleasure which he evinced in waiting upon us relieved us amounted to giving aid and comfort to the enemy, by a conspiracy to abduct and murder President Lincoln; this was

BED YOUR STABLES.-A horse, remarks the Rural World, will get tired of standthe Rural World, will get tired of standing and treading on a hard floor; so will a cow, a sheep, a man. A soft bed feels easy—gives rest. And yet we neglect the bedding of our stables to a great extent. Injured limbs and other aliments, especially of the hoof, are the results often of a neglect here, as has results often of a neglect here, as has been clearly enough shown, and as any man can clearly enough see, if he gives the subject a moment's thought. Bed with straw, which is plenty, or sawdust, or tanbark, or shavings. The dryer these materials are, the better. Every day remove moistened bedding, and replace with new. Such a floor, well bedded, adds greatly to the warmth of a stable; and thus becomes a fodder-saver. The small holes and crevices in a floor, From the Terminus of the Union with a good bedding upon them, will let little or no cold through, and will drain the stable. Rather have a ground floor, than a hard naked plank .- Amer-
