In the 10th Ward, of this city, September 4th, 1882, of pneumonia, EMMA daughter of Robert and Lois Widdison, aged 9 months and 22 days.

of Latter-day Saints in 1850; emigrated with his family to Utah in 1884. He leaves a wife and four children, and fifteen grand children. He died in full faith of the Gospel.—COM. Mill Star, please copy.

In the 19th Ward, Salt Lake City, Sept. 8, 1882, of Typhoid fever, ALFRED GOOD-YEAR, aged 62 years, 6 months and 24 days. Deceased was born in Lindley, Yorkshire, England, Feb. 14, 1820. He joined the Church in 1845, emigrated to Utah in 1884. He settled in Farmington, Davis Co., where he lived until a little over a year ago, when he and his wife moved to Salt Lake City. Deceased leaves a wife and one son. He lived and died a faithful member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

OBITUARY.

AMANDA MALVINA HAMMOND, daughter of Benjamin and Almida Hammond, was born May 6, 1827, in the town of Penobscot, State of Maine. Joined the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, when very young, received endowment and was sealed to Harrison Burgess in Nauvoo, February 6, 1848, shared in the persecutions, and was driven with the Saints from that place. Emigrated to Utah, performing that hard and tedious journey in company with Sophia M. Burgess, their husband leaving them in June, 1884, to go on a mission to England, resided in Salt Lake City from that time until called South in the fall of 1882, when she with her husband and family settled in Pine Valley, Washington County, until July 17th, 1882, when she journeyed to Provo to be treated for a cancer, while there she developed in the head set in (of which disease she had had a severe attack in the winter) and died August 8th, 1882, having been there about three weeks, during which time she had received every care and attention. Her remains were prepared for burial and placed in a metallic coffin, accompanied by her husband and oldest son, was placed on the cars and brought to Pine Valley, where they arrived on the 12th inst. at 5 o'clock a. m., 87 hours from Provo. On Sunday, the 13th inst., at two p. m., her remains were carried to the Meeting House by her sons and friends, followed by her husband, family, the Relief Society, the Y. M. C. Y. L. and Primary Associations. Meeting opened by singing, "40 Loud responses, to Thy call." Prayer by Bishop R. W. Jones. Singing, "Sister thou wast mild and lovely." The speakers for the occasion were Bishop Robert Gardner, sen., Robert L. Lloyd and Harrison Burgess. The remarks were very appropriate, comforting and consoling to the family and friends of the deceased. Dismissed by singing, "Mid Scenes of Confusion." The remains were then placed in a wagon and taken to the cemetery, followed by 18 wagons, and interred by the side of her three children, two of whom had been buried within the last eight months. She was the mother of 11 children and 24 grandchildren. She leaves a husband and eight children (4 sons and 4 daughters) and a numerous circle of relatives and friends to mourn her loss. She was truly a faithful mother in Israel, a true Latter-day Saint, and a faithful believer in all the principles of this great latter-day work. A short time previous to her demise, she left a faithful testimony with the Sisters of the Relief Society, of which society she had been second Counselor since April 1st, 1874; she expressed gratitude to her Heavenly Father that she had been privileged to raise her family in the celestial order of marriage, that her footsteps had been guided by Providence out of the paths of the wicked and ungodly, and planted them on a sure foundation; said if she lived she was in the hands of the Lord, and if she died she was also in His hands; exhorted her sisters to faithfulness and diligence, to unity and endurance to the end. Surely her life and character are worthy of imitation.

HARRISON BURGESS.

GEORGE BRAY, of Kanosh, Millard County, Utah, peacefully departed this life August 30th, 1882. Brother Bray was born in 1808, in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, England, where he received the Gospel, and after bearing a faithful testimony in that district for several years, emigrated to Utah in 1852, crossing the sea in the *William Tappan*, and the Plains from Florence in the company of President Henry Miller. Brother Bray has two sons in New Zealand, and one daughter in Gateshead-upon-Tyne, England, and two sons and one daughter in Kanosh, where Brother Bray has been an active member of the Teacher's Quorum for the past fourteen years, and an active High Priest whose special mission has been to administer to the spiritual needs of the sick amongst the Saints, possessing the gift of healing in an eminent degree. He was ever ready by night or by day, in sunshine or storm to go forth with words of comfort and testimony to cheer and alleviate the sufferings of those who believed in the ordinances of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He was a kind and fatherly teacher of the little ones in our Sunday school. We will miss him here, for Brother Bray was one of the men of whom it may be said, "He went about doing good."—[COM.]
