SUBSTITUTES FOR COAL.

Number of Articles Suggested to Provide Heat for Domestic Use.

With the growing scarcity of coal, the talk increases as to possible substitutes. Already the consumption of gas in this city, as a substitute for coal in cooking and heating, has retarded perceptibly the growing increase in the consumption of coal; and now it is certain that coke will be used as far as possible to further lighten the demand for coal.

The Utah Gas & Coke company has several hundred tons of coke already piled up on its west side premises, and is add-ing to its size every day, so that when cold weather comes there will be quite a reserve to draw from. The output of the company when running in full blast will be about 50 tons per day. The Utah Light & Railway company is also making coke daily, but its product at present is limited, and is being used by the candy factories in this city, with the remaining part shipped to California. Both com-panies are using the same coal, so that the quality of the coke is about the same. The Utah Gas & Coke company is charg-ing 6.25 per ton at the plant and 87.57 per ton delivered to consumers; where-es, the Light & Railway company is charging 37 at the yards, and is deliv-ared to consumers; both companies charg-in 50 cents per ton additional when delivered in bags. For out of town shipments, the Gas & Coke company charges for carload tots F.O.B. cars on the local sidings at \$7.76 per ton, reserv-ing the right to supply local domestic domands first.
