Loss of life was less than anticipated, but one person so far as known having succumbed. An unidentified man was frozen in a snowdrift down town. Communication from Senator Kearns Weather Map Indicates a General Urges Creation of Department Freezing Up Throughout Entire Intermountain Region.

IS MODERATING

So Low As It Has Been.

There was a slight improvement in the weather today, the lowest record being zero between 6 and 7 o'clock. At a. m. the mercury had risen to one degree above zero; at 9 a. m. it was three degrees above; at 10 a. m. six degrees, and by 11:30 the thermometer had gone up to 17 degrees. Yesterday morning the record was two degrees below zero. The weather office map indicates continued fair skies, although there is a low pressure to the north. which later may develop into a storm unless it passes to the east before the torm can materialize. Section Director Murdach looks for a gradual, though slow improvement in the temperature, and thinks the worst of the confi weath-

#### er is over. COLD IN OTHER PLACES.

The day's weather map shows a gen-eral condition of cold all over the coun-try west of the great lakes. Even at Portland inst night, there was a killing frost, the thermometer there indicating 30 degrees—something very unusual in that section; and at Los Angeles the mercury went down to 32, which means a lot of trouble for the orange and fruit growers.
