The Rev. Benj. Brewster, Dean of St. Mark's, On Memorial Day And Whitsunday.

The Rev. Benjamin Brewster preached his last sermon dean of St. Mark's cathedral Sunday morning. He leaves this week to be consecrated as bishop or western Colorado. In his address Sunday he combined the spirit of Whitsunday with the Memorial day thought. For his subject he took St. John, vili: 31-32-"The Law of Christ and Human Lib-In treating the subject he said:

"In two ways this day has important meanings for us. As churchmen, on this Whitsunday, we thankfully remember that gift of spiritual power to the disciples which marked the birthday of the Christian church. As American citizens, on this Memorial day, we honor a mighty company of noble dead, whose sacrifice meant much in the story of human liberty. The coinci-dence in the calendar suggests to us dence in the calendar suggests to us the profound harmony that subsists between the true ideals before the Christian church, and the ideals to be held before this nation dedicated to hu-

man freedom.

"The lot is fallen unto us in a fair ground: Yea, we have a goodly heritage." Through no merit of our own, but at the cost of generations of struggle, we have free room, here in America, to realize progressively both the true idea of the Christion church. Each ideal gains immensely by this independence of mutual interference. For this we ought to be thankful, as churchmen ind as patriots, on this Whitsunday, on this Memorial day.

"Yet no mistake could be more fatal fhan to confuse thankfulness with complacency. It is not for us to rest satisfied with the thought of what has been attained in human progress.

modern saloon—then, I say, we ought to ask ourselves what we are doing to make this civilization of ours a Christian civilization, to exalt the moral supremacy of the meek and lowly, yet the brave and righteous, Jesus. Are these the worthy fruits of that human liberty for which the heave men where the worthy fruits of that human liberty for which the brave men whose graves we decorate gave their lives? Oh! it is time for us in this country to lay more emphasis than we have upon 'the discipline of virtue.' And it is high time for us Christians to search ourselves anew as to the continuance in Christ's word, our discipleship, through which He promised the knowledge of the truth, the truth that shall make us free.

"When, moreover, we reflect upon the meaning of 'continuing in the word' of meaning of 'continuing in the word' of Christ, we are bound to see anew that it is a fellowship in Him. No solidary salvation, innocent of service, is possible for the Christian. In Him we 'are builded together,' says the apostle, 'for an habitation of God through the spirit.' Union, not separateness; brotherhood, not clannishness, accords with the Christian ideals. Evan so, we remember today a large vision of human brotherhood, transcending sectionalism and particular interests, inspired the courage and ennobled the sacrifice of those whose martyrdom for the nation we honor. Much more inspiring should be to us the vision of that fellowship we honor. Much more inspiring should be to us the vision of that fellowship in Christ, the ideal of the Catholic church, the solidarity of that 'blessed company,'—here and at rest— 'of all faithful people.' We should count it a privilege to strengthen the bonds of that fellowship in Christ, to reach out and help those who need to widen ever. and help those who need, to widen ever more and more the circle of that Christ-centered brotherhood. This means missions, it means rescue work,

means missions, it means rescue work, it means active service in the church at large, in the diocese, in the parish.

"It is indeed with thankful thoughts of the hopeful service rendered so cheerfully to Christ by many in this parish, that I say these things. The Rev. Mr. Perkins said: "In the nomadic life of the patriarchs there was one spot that became sacred. It was a burying place. As they went from place to place, with no permanent abiding place, this one spot became endeared to them. At least they might have one spot to look forward to where their weary bodies might have a final resting place. It became the home for the wornout body.

"So it would seem upon this one day of the year with us. The inhabitants of our land travel a great deal. They seek to better their physical condition. But wherever they may be today they are reminded of the history of the country. The bodies of heroes laid to rest have made the soil of the land sacred. These faithful ones of old have made our homes possible. Before them we stand uncovered and bedeck their graves with sweet flowers and would ever cherish their memories with the sweetest fra-

grance.
"They have not only made our home possible, but our land has become the home of countless thousands of other Jum for the political refugee, the slave of economical tyrants comes to our door and asks permission to enter. With outstretched arms we welcome him as a brother; having been through adver-sity ourselves we can sympathize with him.
