HOW TO BURN COAL .- A very ommon mistake is made and much fuel wasted in the manner of then put on merely enough to show a layer of black coal covering the red. This will soon kindle, and as grate so soon as fresh coal is put on, thus leaving all heat in the ashes when it should be sent to the new supply of coal. The time to stir the fire is just when the new coal laid on is pretty well kindled. This method of managing a coal fice is troublesome, but it saves fuel, gives a more uniform heat, and prevents the discomfort of alternations of heat and cold above referred to. Lewis' Rural.
