James L. Carter, who is in charge of the transfers of J. P. Morgan & Co., said today that purchases of small amounts of stock was breaking all records. He added:

"With prices at bed rock, the small investor has availed himself of a rare opportunity to invest his savings in securities that will show a handsome return in the future. Our transfer department has all it can do to keep upwith the press of husiness. The number of shareholders in railroads and industrial companies is increasing rapidly, and as the movement progresses stocks disappear from the market and find a resting place in strong boxes. All the way from one to 50 shares are being purchased by the ordinary buyer. A feature of the small lot buying is lovestment by women who never enter the market until prices are at lowest ebb.
