VISIT TO SALT LAKE.

Ogden, Utah,

July 18th, 1875.

(Continued.)

The origin of the lake is a question

about which our learned men

differ, and no records have been

kept until quite recent years. There

is an old record, however, made in

an old beach on all the mountains

merging directly into the lake, showing

evidence that the water was once

several hundred feet above the

present level, and that the water

breccia that is shown was once

entirely fresh, and the water

had communication with the sea

by the Colorado river or some other

channel. In the geological chan-

nel, through which this country

has passed, the communication has

been broken, and a salt sea has

been formed by the evaporation of

the sea. Early settlers of this

country have a story of ten feet or

more in the water since 1850. Since

1858 there has been a slight eleva-

tion in the level, from which it

is argued that the highest point

was reached at that time. The

changes of level, however, have

only been noted by the difference

in the depth of water upon the

beaches. A well pillar has been

erected near the shore at Black

Rock to indicate correctly any

changes in the rise or fall. The

Park of the Desert University is

to supervise these records, and to

forward them to the Smithsonian

institute at Washington. Now

that the Utah Western railroad is

opened, Salt Lake City is virtually

moved to the shore, and the lake

is brought into close connection

with the rest of the world. It will

become a place of summer resort,

not only to the citizens of Utah,

but to the people of the east and

the west, as well as the charming

beaches that are now being devel-

oped. The summer temperature, even
