Jubilee at Ogden.

OGDEN CITY, Utah, Sept. 19th, 1877.

Editors Deseret News:

One of the loveliest scenes upon which I have gazed for a long time past, was the hosts of Zion's children who took part in the

GRAND JUBILEE CONCERT.

It took place to-day at the Tabernacle in this city. It was the second of the season and was gotten up under the management of the officers of the Sunday School Union of Weber County.

At half past nine o'clock, a. m., many of the youth of both sexes from quite a number of the Wards in this county assembled on Union Square, when the procession was formed under the direction of Prof. Monch, Marshal of the day. The procession extended about two blocks in length.

Shortly before ten o'clock, headed by the Ogden Brass Band it marched up Main Street to the Tabernacle, where under the direction of the Marshal the immense assembly of Sabbath School children were seated, and who with the spectators completely filled the house. The building had been neatly and tastefully decorated for the occasion by Mr. John Frost and family, assisted by Mr. Thos. D. Dee, Mrs. T. G. Odell, and the two Misses Dinsdale. The stand was illuminated with beautiful bouquets; and in the centre stood an artificial weeping willow, artistically arranged by Miss Elizabeth Carr.

The Concert opened with the "Jubilee Song" by the full company, followed by an appropriate prayer by Bishop Robert McQuarrie.

The programme consisted of anthems, songs, duets, glees, &c., of which the following are a part: "Oh Praise God," "Never Forget the Dear Ones," "There's a Sigh in the Heart," "Wake the Song of Jubilee," "A Voice From the Waves," "Gather Round the Standard Bearer," "Richard the Third," "What are the Wild Waves Saying?" "The Gipsy Countess," "The Ship on Fire," &c., &c. Those who took part in the exercises were the 1st District Sabbath School, Moundport Sabbath School, Misses Mattie Brown, and Martha Jackson, Third District Sabbath school, Prof. Wm. Pugh and John Fowler, Miss Sarah Fowler, Mr. Wm. Pierce, Mrs. Mary Freeman, select Choir, Misses Nellie, and Polly and Mary Driver, Mr. Clarence Boyle, The Marriotts, Slaterville and Lynne Sabbath schools, the Ogden Brass Band, under the direction of Capt. W. Pugh. The "Old Hundred" by the full company concluded the entertainment. Every piece was well rendered and elicited the hearty appreciation of the numerous spectators.

In the afternoon there was dancing, swinging, and various athletic exercises at Jones' Grove, the brass and quadrille bands were in attendance. At night there was a grand ball in the First Ward Assembly Rooms. The day was beautiful, all that could be desired. Everything went off peaceably and harmoniously. The Jubilee Concert was a musical and intellectual feast, and will be long remembered by those who were present on the occasion.

NEW YORK, 24.—The World says, there was one case of yellow fever at an up town hospital. The patient contracted the disease at Ferdinandia and just arrived by sail.

CHICAGO, 24.—Early callers at the Fidelity Savings bank, this morning, found its doors closed and a hastily penned card thereon informing the depositors that a petition for a receiver would be filed in the Superior Court, to day; that the bank would remain closed pending the decision of that question in the court. The motion was made, and as the officers of the bank made no opposition, Judge Moore decided to appoint the receiver this afternoon, by which time he hoped the officers and depositors would have agreed upon the man. The petition alleges that the officers have been sacrificing valuable securities in order to realize cash upon them, and that the bank is already insolvent. It is believed the assets will be much larger in proportion than those of the State Savings Bank.

The grand jury has indicted Spencer, Guild and Bulky, officers of the State Savings Bank, for the embezzlement of \$700,000. None of them are in the city, nor is their present whereabouts known.

CLEVELAND, O., 24.—Mrs. James St. Clair and her two children, a son and daughter, of this city, were poisoned eating toast stools, mistaken for mushrooms, yesterday. The two children died last evening. The mother is not expected to recover.
