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JORDAN STAKE CONFERENCE.

GENEALOGY.

Instructions to all interested in getting names from genealogical library—Manti Temple Lists.

Many letters are received by this department asking what can be learned in regard to this or that family in the genealogical library here in Salt Lake City. We will here endeavor to give a brief summary of sources of information contained there, and if all concerned will study this article carefully, they will be able to write direct to the society, and will know just what to ask about, and have the assistance of the society.

The books contained now in this society were obtained by purchase in England, and in Boston. There are about 400 English books and a like number of American books. The books are arranged in the English department are: First, Burke's Commoners, and Burke's Landowners. These four bulky volumes contain brief notes about all the old English families, and are the most reliable. Then, there are the 30 odd volumes published by the Harleian society. These among other things contain the various visitations of the counties of England. That is, in the sixteenth, and seventeenth centuries, royal messengers, or heralds, now called census takers, visited the counties and obtained the pedigrees of all the county families. These are called "visitations." Then this society has published such volumes as the London Marriages, Births and Deaths. Also, many parish registers, and the registers of many old and famous churches. These necessarily contain much scattered information of great value to Latter-day Saints. For it will be found that this people have sprung from the same stock, and are of every nation. There are also some family genealogies, or pedigrees. The history of Scottish families is given in four bulky volumes, called the Scottish Nation. Other English books are the genealogical magazines, and similar publications.

In the American section, there are first, Savage's Genealogical Dictionary. This volume contains the brief pedigrees of a large number of the early American families, with names and some dates. Then, there are the splendid series of volumes of New England Genealogical Magazines, over 40 of them, which come regularly now. Also, the New York Biographical and Historical Magazine, which has reached its thirty-eighth volume. These magazines publish all sorts of valuable genealogical data, and it is some instances, whole pedigrees of famous families are herein given. These contain excellent indexes, without which such books are almost useless. Then, there are county records, which are county records of births, deaths, marriages, and burials, with church and parish registers. Town and county histories, all these are mines of information for the eager genealogist. Added to these are books of genealogy, and information, such as English Surnames; homes of family names; also many English and Scotch catalogues in which all English and Scotch genealogical books are noted; a book treating on the subject of genealogy, and last, and most important of all, there are the English guide, and the American index. Indeed, these last are the first books a searcher after genealogy would open. For instance, if a person asks me what there is in the library in regard to the Bigelow, I would take up Mumfells's American Index and turn to the Hs. Here I would find Bigelow. And following the name, I would find the title of all the American books now published which contain references or pedigrees of the Bigelow.

Then, I would begin with Mr. Hoxley's "Bigelow Genealogy" and follow the line of descent, and then I would find the letter B, and would find every book listed in the Guide which contains genealogical information about the English family of Bigelow. The way to the stake, and the book is shelved, searching every single book through its index for any mention of the name we are after.
