

ASSEMBLED TO SEE WORLD DESTROYED

Triune Immersionists Gather in
Their House of Worship Wait-
ing for Predicted Event.

WAS DEFERRED FOR 24 HOURS

Confident that the Destruction
Perseid Will Come, and Are
Still Looking for It.

Westbury, Mass., Sept. 24.—Im-
mersionists gathered today
to see the end of the world, the
end of the world, the end of the
world, as they prefer to be
called, assembled about their place of
worship early in the forenoon to await
the destruction and purification of the
world by fire in fulfillment of their
own prophecies.

In contrast with recent proceedings
when noisy revival services have been
carried on far into the night, last night
passed almost in silence as the rain fell

gathered here from far and near are shel-
tered. In fact, by some the gathering
of heavy clouds at sundown last night
was declared to be a "sign" and the
"downpour" of the night an

tions.

The morning was dismal. The sky

damp and oppressive. The snowy
appearance of the little wooden chapel at
which the members call the com-
munity was sharply outlined against
the dull backgrounds of clouds and
mist.

In this chapel for the last week serv-
ices have been held, the keynote of
which has been a "frenzied exhortation
to those who were waiting the pale to
repent and to be prepared for the
predicted cataclysm and yesterday after-
noon 18 converts were baptized in a
nearby pond.

Throughout the meetings, great en-
thusiasm has been manifested. The snowy
appearance of the little wooden chapel at
which the members call the com-
munity was sharply outlined against
the dull backgrounds of clouds and
mist.

As the appointed time drew near, the
believers filed the chapel and devoted
their energies to the singing of hymns,
before 10 o'clock the skies
darkened and those who had been
waiting for a sign appeared convinced
that the millennium was at hand.

The hymn followed another as the
believers watched for the final purifi-
cation.

Ten o'clock came but the sky bright-
ened, and the millennium, in the opinion
of the believers, was apparently post-
poned for a brief period.

It was then explained that a revela-
tion which was made to one of their
number last night, indicated that the
destruction was to be deferred until
some time during the 24 hours begin-
ning this evening.

The faithful still continued confident
that their prophecies would be ful-
filled and they spent the remainder of
the forenoon praying and singing
hymns. There was very little comment
when the hour designated for the final
to of earthly things passed.

ORDERED TO ESTABLISH TRACK CONNECTIONS

Heena, Mont., Sept. 24.—The state
board of railroad commissioners today
issued an order directing that the
first Northern and Milwaukee lines
establish track connections and pro-
vide facilities for interchange of pas-
sengers and freight at Judith Gap and
Laramie, where the respective lines
crossed. The order is regarded as one
of the most important in the history of
the commission, as it means the
making accessible of a large territory
to all shipping centers of the state.

CRUISER SQUADRON ARRIVES.

New York, Sept. 24.—The German
cruiser squadron composed of the Vi-
ctoria Louise, Hertha, Bremen and Dres-
den, which will participate in the Hud-
son-Fulton ceremonies, arrived in New
York today, reaching quarantine sta-
tion at 4:30 a. m. The British battle-
ship inflexible under command of Ad-
miral Sir Edward Hobart Seymour,
arrived off Sandy Hook this morning
and will leave with the other British
warships, which have been awaiting
their arrival since yesterday. The
British ships remained at anchor off
the Hook. The American cruiser
Macon arrived this morning to join
the other American warships anchored
in Hudson river.

COL. ROOSEVELT KILLS TWO MORE ELEPHANTS

Nairobi, Sept. 24.—Theodore Roose-
velt, who is hunting in the Mweru
district, has bagged two more ele-
phants. Mr. Roosevelt will soon leave
the Mweru territory for the Quana
Nzira river.

Mr. Roosevelt has killed one ele-
phant and a rhinoceros. He will shortly
move over to Lake Hannington, in
Seydelia province and continue his
hunting there.

PEARY'S FRIENDS VERY VINDICTIVE

Retain Lawyer to Make Full In-
vestigation of Details of Cook's
Ascent of Mount McKinley.

THEY HOPE TO DISCREDIT HIM

Gen. Hubbard Believed to Have Re-
ceived Peary's Alleged Proofs That
Cook Did Not Reach Pole.

New York, Sept. 24.—Friends of Dr.
Frederick A. Cook, whose claim that he
discovered the north pole has been
challenged by Commander R. E. Peary,
anticipate a bitter attack on his record.
The announcement several days ago
that a lawyer representing the Peary
Arctic club had been retained at Seat-
tle, Wash., to fully investigate all the
details of Dr. Cook's reported ascent
of Mount McKinley, is followed now
by Dr. Cook's effort to have one of the
guides who accompanied him on that
expedition come to New York. He has
sent a telegram to this guide, Edward
Burrill at Hamilton, Mont., asking him
to come to New York to get the full con-
text of the Peary charges will be made public in a few
days, possibly next week.

Among the papers and documents
which Commander Peary turned over to
Gen. Thomas H. Hubbard in Maine
yesterday, are believed to be his alleged
proofs that Cook did not reach the
pole, and from Gen. Hubbard's state-
ment at Bar Harbor, it is presumed
that the full context of the Peary
charges will be made public in a few
days, possibly next week.

Peary's friends are very vindictive
and are determined to discredit him
by every means in their power.

JOSEPH LUCAS DEAD.

America by P. T. Barnum.

Kansas, City, Sept. 24.—Joseph Lu-
cas, the last member of the first fam-
ily of Albinos to be exhibited in Amer-
ica, died at the general hospital here
early today.

Holland by P. T. Barnum. In recent
years Lucas had been employed as a
chambermaid in a local restaurant.

OMAHA STREET CAR WAR GROWING WORSE

Omaha, Sept. 24.—There were numer-
ous instances of stone throwing at
street cars last night before all the
cars were stopped by the police. A

rived yesterday, was deeply affected when
the vessel passed the Statue of Liberty
yesterday. He bowed his head and cheer-
ed with the rest of the sailors, but
while doing so he fell overboard and
was killed. The vessel stopped the work-
ing of his heart.

SOME OF JOSEPH'S WHEAT.

New Haven, Conn., Sept. 24.—Some of

seven years' famine in Egypt has been
received by Valentine Hammer of Hud-
son. The wheat was stored in the nine-
teenth dynasty, 1,500 years before Christ,
or more than 2,500 years ago.

DEATHS FROM HURRICANE OVER ONE HUNDRED

New Orleans, Sept. 24.—Related re-
ports today of death and destruction
from Monday's hurricane in Louisiana
and Mississippi show further loss of
life and property. The list of dead is
now over 100.

News of 15 additional deaths along
the waterways between Morgan City,
La., and the Gulf and on the adjacent
coast has been received. Nearly all
of these were fishermen.
