ods, which are said to be used chiefly to help the promoters to reap a rich harvest.

It is also said that the representations made by agents in selling such stocks are often misleading in that they call attention to a few successful insurance companies and make no mention of the large number of such corporations whose shareholders have suffered loss.

In concluding their resolution the commissioners of the 37 states who were present, pledged themselves to put an end to this traffic, which is believed to be pernicious. They also recommend the passage by the various states of laws requiring the capital stock of all insurance companies shall be fully paid up in cash before a charter is issued, and prohibiting the licensing or any company if the expenses of its organization and of placing its stock has exceeded five per cent of the total contribution by its stockholders.

SEEKS TO IMPROVE BUSINESS.

Insurance Commissioners at National Convention Adopt Resolutions.

A copy of the resolution directed against promoting schemes and unmercifully adopted at the meeting of the national convention of insurance Commissioners, held at Colorado Springs Aug. 24, has been received by State Insurance Commissioner George B. Squires.

The resolution was adopted because of the widespread traffic in the stocks of newly organized or projected insurance corporations and holding companies, who purchased these stocks of such stocks, through soliciting agents. The object of the resolution is to warn the public against such schemes, as the sale of such stocks through soliciting agents involves much expense and the amount invested by the purchaser cannot go into the treasury of the company. Most of the plans now in vogue provide for a payment of 20 per cent of the shareholder's contribution to the selling agent. So that before the company begins to do business one-fifth of the amount put into the business by the shareholder is lost.

The commissioners in their convention, however, themselves say that even if all the amounts put in by the shareholder went into the business it takes conservative and economical management not only to insure reasonable returns, but to prevent losses. While they do not intend to discourage the formation of new companies, they state that substantial insurance assessments are wholly unnecessary to the organization of such companies. This, they say, is proved by the number of companies organized during recent years without such meth-

STATE TREASURER'S REPORT.

David Mattson Files Monthly Statement With State Auditor.

The August report of State Treasurer Mattson has been filed with the state auditor. It shows receipts to be \$83,685.67, of which \$69,657.16 was the balance of the year from the previous month. The disbursements were as follows:

General fund, \$131,789.78; state school fund, \$88,640; state fish and game fund, \$14,396.01; extermination of wild animals, \$13,621; county road, school fund, forest reserve, \$23,346.01; state lands fund account, principal and interest, \$13,829.41.

MAY RETIRE POPULAR OFFICER

Capt. Richard Rifenberrich Ordered To Appear For Examination.

With the appointment of a retiring board to consider the case of Capt.

Richard Rifenberrich of the Fifteenth Infantry, it is probable that one of the officers of the section of Fort Douglas will be retired in the near future from active service because of ill health.

Under orders received from the War Department the retiring board will consist of Maj. Willis T. May, Andrew S. Rowan, Fifteenth Infantry; Maj. William E. Purviance, medical corps; Capt. Willis Ulme, Fifteenth Infantry; First Lieut. Thomas B. McGehee, medical corps; Capt. William A. Cavenagh, Fifteenth Infantry.

Capt. Rifenberrich literally "won his spurs," rising from the ranks during the Spanish-American war and the Philippine insurrection, and although still comparatively a young man has seen much hard service. He entered the service in 1899 and within a short time became a sergeant in the Sixteenth Infantry. Shortly after he was promoted to be first lieutenant in the Twenty-ninth Infantry, and then to his captaincy in the Fifteenth. During his service in the Philippines he contracted a chronic disease which has incapacitated him from recent actual service.

All the officers of the retiring board are stationed at Fort Douglas, but at present are with their regiment on the Mexican march. The date of meeting of the board will not be fixed until their return to the post.
