SEEKS TO IMPROVE BUSINESS.
Insurance Commissioners at National Convention Adopt Resolutions.

A copy of the resolution directed against promoting schemes and unannouncedly adopted at the Fortieth session of the national convention of insurance commissioners, held at Colorado Springs Aug. 24, has been received by State Insurance Commissioner George B. Squires. The resolution was adopted because of the widespread traffic in the stocks of newly organized or projected insurance corporations and holding companies, whose principal securities consist of such stocks, through soliciting agents. The object of the resolution is to warn the public against such schemes, as the sale of such stocks through soliciting agents involves much expense and the amount invested by the purchaser cannot go into the treasury of the company. Most of the plans now in vogue provide for the payment of 25 per cent of the shareholder's contribution to the selling agent, so that before the company begins to do business one-fifth of the amount put into the business by the shareholder is a loss.

STATE TREASURER'S REPORT.

David Mattison Files Monthly Statement With State Auditor.

The August report of State Treasurer Mattison has been filed with the state auditor. It shows receipts to be \$88,886.67, of which \$24,671.16 was the balance left over from the previous month. The disbursements were as follows: General fund, \$131,790.75; state district school fund, \$68,689; state fish and game fund, \$4,395.45; extermination of wild animals, \$137.63; county road school fund, forest reserve, \$3,346.81; state lands fund account, principal and interest, \$73,829.41.

MAY RETIRE POPULAR OFFICER

Capt. Richard Rifenberich Ordered To Appear For Examination.

With the appointment of a retiring board to consider the case of Capt.

Richard Rifenberich of the Fifteenth infantry, it is probable that one of the most popular officers at Fort Douglas will be retired in the near future from active service because of ill health.

Under orders received from the war department the retiring board will consist of Maj. Willis T. May, Andrew S. Bowen, Fifteenth infantry; Maj. William E. Parvance, medical corps; Capt. White (Juno), Fifteenth infantry; First Lieut. Thomas B. McGowan, medical reserve corps; Capt. William A. Cavanaugh, Fifteenth infantry.

Capt. Rifenberich literally "won his spurs," riding from the ranks during the Spanish-American war and the Philippine insurrection, and although still comparatively a young man has seen much hard service. He entered the service in 1892 and within a short time gained a second lieutenantcy in the Sixteenth infantry. Shortly afterwards he was promoted to be first lieutenant in the Twenty-ninth infantry, and then to his captaincy in the Fifteenth. During his service in the Philippines he contracted a chronic disease which has incapacitated him from recent actual service.

All the officers of the retiring board are stationed at Fort Douglas, but at present are with their regiment on the pacific march. The date of meeting of the board will not be fixed until their return to the post.
