VACCINE "ORDERS" APPROVED

By City Council-Court Notes-Wedding Bells-Farmers' Meeting.

Provo, Dec. 20 .- At the meeting of the city council, last evening, the committee on judiciary reported as follows in the matter of the petition of the board of health to appropriate money for the purpose of paying expenses of vaccinating the pupils and teachers of the schools in Provo City, recommending: "That this council appropriate the sum of \$150 to be placed in the hands of the board of health for the purposes of purchasing enough vacine to vaccinate all the teachers and pupils attending the public and private chools of Provo City, also all children who are under school age, who may desire vaccination.

'We also recommend that this councll approve and sustain the board of health in the position they have taken in complying with the order of the state board of health.
