Miss Martha Snell Succumbs to Long liiness-Pathetic Obsequies.

Spanish Fork, Utah County, Aug. 8.— Sunday the funeral of Miss Martha Snell was held in the Fourth ward meeting-house. The house was filed to overflow-ing, a large number of people being un-able to find seats, but remained on the outside.
