Gen. Porter, With Much Ceremony,
Delivers It to Representatives
Of the United States.

IN AMERICAN CHURCH IN PARIS.

Distinguished Gathering of French
And American Officials Present
During the Transfer.

U. S. MARINES AS GUARDS.

Paris, July 6.—The ceremony of the delivery of the body of Admiral Paul Jones to the representatives of the United States was held at 3:30 this afternoon in the American church on the Avenue de l'Alma in the presence of the distinguished gathering of the highest official military and naval dignitaries of France, the diplomatic representatives of many countries and the special ambassadors and naval authorities sent from the United States to receive the body.

Great crowds converged on the avenue leading to the church. Within the church was a beautiful altar decorated with flowers. The body of Admiral Jones lay in state on a white-covered casket draped with the American flag. The casket was surrounded by a number of American and French officials, and the body of the admiral was placed in the casket by the French officials. Grain Future Contracts.

New York, July 6.—At a meeting of the New York grain trade at the produce exchange it has been decided to authorize trading in grain future contracts of 1,000 bushels. The present minimum is 5,000 bushels. This will, it is expected, increase the volume of trading in grain futures.

Patrick Will Appeal.

New York, July 6.—It is announced that Albert T. Patrick, who is awaiting execution for the murder of William Marsh Rice, the multi-millionaire, has instructed his counsel, David B. Hill, to take his case to the United States supreme court. The execution of Patrick is set for the week commencing Aug. 7, and the appeal will act as a temporary stay.

Commercial Insolventcies for 1905.

New York, July 6.—Commercial insolventcies in the United States during the first half of 1905, were 4,125 in number and \$50,994,555 in amount of defaulted indebtedness, according to the Journal of Commerce. Numerically this is a record for the year, and compares with the 6,214 failures in the corresponding six months of last year, but a decrease appears when last year's liabilities of \$78,499,999 are considered.

ANNIE GRANT, ACTRESS, Charged With Stealing a \$10,000 Pearl Necklace.

City Gets Five Hundred Thousand Dollars

That Amount Received From the Mutual Life and Placed in New York Bank to be Drawn Upon as Required—Local Authorities Nearly Ready to Begin the Great Work for More Water and Better Sewerage.
