Against smeller frust. Commenting on the "smeller smoke" case now on trial before Judge Car-penter at Denver, the Post says: "Perhaps no case that has ever come up in a local court has proven itself of more vital interest than has this case in which J. B. Hindry, a prominent pioneer of the city, is suing the Globe Smelting and Refining company for \$100,000 damages.
