The Home Dramat Club pro-duce Saragosa on Monday, Jan. 23, the date to be celebrated as New Year's Eve. This is one of the most cele-brated pieces from the pen of the famous French dramatist, Maurice Maeterlinck, and has had pronounced success in the eastern and western theatres. The Laramie Times says: There are about 200 men employed on the Denver and Rio Grande grade in the Comanche valley. A Nimble Thief.—A nimble piece of petty stealing was done on Main Street yesterday. A man from the country brought a box containing a couple of well-buckets and a rope, out of Z. C. M. I. and placed it on the sidewalk. He re-entered the store and came out again in about two or three minutes, only to find that, in that brief time, somebody had taken the buckets and rope out of the box and vanished with them. The police failed to find any clue to the thief. The theory of the officers is that the party who stole them put them in a wagon and immediately drove off.

More Consistency Wanted.—On our fourth page will be found a lengthy disquisition on the evils of intemperance. It emanates from the McKenize Reform Club. De-nuded of its superfluous wording, its intent is to discourage the use of in-temperating liquors in private houses during the holidays. We are in full and unqualified sympathy with the purport of the disertation.

In elaborating upon the evils of intemperance, the following passage, as will be observed, occurs in the paper:

"To bring these things home to all, let it be noticed, that here is an enterprising and beautiful city, where the temptations to strong drink are so numerous and seduc-tive, that hardly a day passes when one may not see staggering along the sidewalks a sorrowful disgrace, to themselves and their friends."

Without intending to cast undue reflection upon the source from which this treatise came, so far as sincerity is concerned, it is, at the same time, in place to observe that a struggle has been for a long time, and especially of late, in progress, in which temperance cuts a most conspicuous figure. A combination of liquor dealers, with judicial and other aid, have been making a determined fight in favor of intemperance and lawlessness, as against law, good order and respectability. During the controversy between the clearly defined right and wrong of a question, where were the Reform stalwarts? Silent as the grave. Not one word was heard from that quarter. Why was this? Was it because the temperance giants all at once became dwarfs? We do not wish to question the sincerity of these gentlemen, but when men are in earnest they generally make it vigorously apparent when occasion requires. We like to see things boiled down to facts. The true champion of a good cause al-ways displays more action than wind.

Theatricals for Monday Next.—

As will be seen by announcement elsewhere, performances of an un-usually attractive character are to be given in the Theatre on Monday afternoon and evening next. The favorites, McKenize, Margotta and Graham, intend presenting the elegant London comedy entitled, "The Secret Agent," and the spectacular two act drama of "Married and Buried," as the holiday amuse-ments. Messrs. Graham, McKenize and Margotta have devoted considerable time within the last few weeks to preparations in connection with these performances, and we have no doubt that their efforts to amuse theatre-goers will be rewarded by overflowing houses.

It may be gratifying to the pub-lic to learn that these gentlemen intend hereafter to more frequently appear on the boards than they have done for some time past, and in view of carrying out this intention, have made arrangements with Eastern publishers and managers for the pro-duction here of several of the latest and most popular dramas and com-edies.

The "May Queen" Opera.—A large audience greeted the perform-ance of this opera, in the Eleventh Ward School-house last evening, which with a very few slight exceptions was performed in a highly creditable manner. The piece is full of interest. The open-ing scene, the crowning of the May Queen," with accompanying chor-us, being really beautiful. The dun-geon scene, where the May Queen is awaiting the hour of ex-ecution and the duets and trios incident to this portion of the piece, are very effective. The author, Brother Evan Stephens, of Logan, Cache County, who is a good musi-cian, has made a decided hit in this piece. The moral of the opera is good; that the virtuous are pro-ected by special providence is exhibited throughout.

The "Duke," by Mr. Alex. Mc-Master, and "Lear," by Mrs. E. Felt, are specially worthy of men-tion. The singing by the Misses Felt was very creditable. "Simon," Mr. Henry Hulbert, and "Sophia," Miss S. E. Vincent, created lots of merriment, and the "Jail," by Mr. A. Derrick, was well received by the audience. The "Duchess," by Miss E. Young, was a very natural piece of acting, and "Dorothy," Miss Amy Penrose, played her part well. The other characters were nicely render-ed. The choruses were sung in good style, and the entire perform-ance gave good satisfaction. The piece will be repeated to night, com-mencing at 8 o'clock.
