Heavy Rain and Hailstorm at Orderville.

The following special came over the wire yesterday afternoon too late to appear in our last evening's edition:

ORDERVILLE, U. T., August 12.

Yesterday afternoon, about 2:45 o'clock, a heavy, dark cloud from the south passed over this place, from which fell large hailstones, some of them from three-quarters of an inch to an inch in diameter. In a few minutes the first cloud was met by another, coming from the opposite direction. This was followed for an hour by one of the heaviest showers of rain ever known in this region. In a few minutes large streams were running in every wash in this vicinity which leads into the valley, the largest running diagonally across our gardens and orchards. The town was flooded, the floors of some of the houses being covered with water from six to 15 inches deep. Hundreds of loads of rock, timber and rubbish were washed from the hills into the streets and on to the gardens and fields, filling up the water sets and irrigation ditches. Much damage was done to land and crops. Careful estimate places the loss at from \$2,500 to \$3,000.

Minstrel Ward Excursion.

The Nineteenth Ward had an enjoyable time at Black Rock, yesterday. The weather being very propitious, bathing in and sailing on the lake were freely indulged in. The usual games were also introduced, such as quoiting, football, jumping the rail, foot races, dancing, etc. The excursionists were well supplied with music, Prof. Beeley's band and the Sunday School martial band being in attendance. All returned home, satisfied with the day's outing, no accident of any kind having occurred to mar the pleasure of the excursion.

The Hopt Murder Case.

Our readers are familiar with the particulars of this case. Hopt was tried and convicted before Judge Emerson and a jury for the murder of Johnny Turner, at Park City on the 4th or 5th of July, 1880. An appeal was taken to the Supreme Court of the Territory, when the decision of the lower court was confirmed. The case is now to be carried to the Supreme Court of the United States. When a decision will be obtained from that court no one knows; in fact, though everybody desires to see Hopt brought to justice, it is very possible, during the long interval, he will be found to have made his escape a la Ben Tacker.

Collision on the Central Pacific.

The Central Pacific passenger train, due at Ogden about 5:30 p. m., was so much behind time last evening that the Utah Central did not wait for her arrival. The cause of the delay is said to have been occasioned by a collision between a Central Pacific emigrant and the regular passenger train due at Ogden on Friday morning. It is reported that considerable damage has been done to the engines, but luckily, so far as has been ascertained, no lives appear to have been lost in the smash.
