An ACT authorizing County Courts to gran

Licenses.

SEC. 3.—No such license shall be transfer-able, unless such transfer shall be sanctioned by the county court or probate fudge. SEC. 4.—If any person shall violate the provisions of any of the preceding section of this act, he shall be guilty of a miede meanor. Will stand for the Season at the
