

THE PLAT E MUDDLE.

A long and tedious discussion occurred on the Plat E muddle, which resulted in the appointment of the city engineer to act in conjunction with a citizens committee.

THE BACK SALARY MATTER.

Loofbourow moved that the matter of the petition to the city of the People's councilmen for salaries during the time they were unlawfully deprived of their seats by the "Liberal" councilmen be referred to the city attorney. Carried.

APPOINTMENTS OF OFFICERS.

Lawson nominated C. E. Offenbach as city sexton.

Karrick nominated J. W. Cottle.

Rich said there seemed to be a prepared list of nominations. He had not been one of those who had been favored to see it.

Moran moved that the nominations be closed.

Folland nominated the present incumbent to succeed himself. He referred to the work performed by him as being the very best.

The vote resulted as follows: Dunne 3, Cottle 3, Offenbach 9.

SEALER OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

Helas named H. S. Thompson.

Folland nominated S. H. Connelly.

Bell named J. R. Montgomery.

The vote was: Thompson 11, Connelly 3, Montgomery 1.

Thompson was declared elected.

BUILDING INSPECTOR.

Albert Leroy Hamilton was elected building inspector under a suspension of the rules.

POLICE JUSTICE.

Bell nominated Fred Kessler as justice of the peace for the Fifth precinct.

Beardsley moved that Justice Gee be continued in office.

On a vote being taken Gee received six ballots and Fred Kessler nine.

CITY MARSHAL.

E. M. Janney was elected city marshal by acclamation.

FIRE CHIEF.

Major Stanton was elected fire chief similarly.

SEWER CONSTRUCTION.

A. M. Shelton received seven votes as superintendent of sewer construction. S. P. Pigman received eight votes for the same office.

WATERMASTER.

For watermaster ex-Councilman Pendleton received three votes and J. M. Harvey twelve.

CHRISTOPHER DIEHL

was unanimously elected to succeed himself as collector of water rates.

BY ACCLAMATION.

W. H. Ryan was similarly elected superintendent of waterworks.

CITY ATTORNEY.

For city attorney Moran nominated E. D. Hoge.

Rich nominated W. G. Van Horne for the same office.

Van Horne received 3 votes and E. D. Hoge 12.

AUDITOR.

Bert Raybould was unanimously elected city auditor.

PLUMBING INSPECTOR.

J. M. Sapsley was elected plumbing inspector.

THE SALTAIR RAILWAY FRANCHISE

again came up and was discussed at length and finally disposed of on a motion by Loofbourow to instruct the city marshal to notify the Union Pacific Railway Company to remove its track on South Temple street far enough to one side to allow the Saltair Company to construct its track over the same thoroughfare, and in the event of its refusal that its road be torn up by the city marshal and his aids.

THE GARBAGE QUESTION.

Beardsley submitted a communication from the Rio Grande Western Railway company, in which it offers to undertake to transport garbage from this city to Bingham canyon for \$40 per car for each trip, and if more than one car is shipped at the same time, each additional car will be taken at \$20, provided proper receptacles for the garbage, etc., are supplied by the city. The city is also to give a bond, securing the company from any harm from indictments or prosecutions that may arise from its undertaking to perform the service.

Referred to the sanitary committee, with the mayor associated, with power to act.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education was held last night, with President Baskin in the chair. The members in attendance were Messrs. Young, Pratt, Alf, Duke, Raybould, Newman, Dooly, Pike, Baldwin and Nelson.

WANT A SCHOOL HOUSE.

Joseph Warburton and 237 others, representing themselves to be residents and taxpayers of the First school district, represented that there were 400 school children in the district and the schoolhouse will accommodate but seventy-five pupils. They therefore asked that the board have a new schoolhouse built in the district.

As the committee on sites and buildings are about to report in favor of the erection of the structure the petition was laid on the table.

HIGH SCHOOL ROOM.

Prof. Millsbaugh, in behalf of the authorities of Leland Stanford University, California, asked for use of high school room on Saturday, June 11, 1892, for the purpose of holding an entrance examination for applications to the University. Granted.

The request was enlarged so as to embrace all like institutions.

SUPERINTENDENT OF CONSTRUCTION.

The committee on sites and buildings recommended that William Pinney, of this city, be appointed as superintendent of construction, at a salary of \$150 a month. Mr. Pinney would not be able to devote his entire time to the business for the ensuing two months, and would be paid according to his services. After two months he would devote all his time to this business. Adopted.

BUILDING SITE PURCHASED.

The same committee recommended that the Whittemore lot, in block 37, plat C, in the Twenty-first Ward, be purchased for the sum of \$10,000, of which \$4,000 should be paid on receipt of the deed, \$3,000 in thirty days and \$3,000 in sixty days. The recommendation was adopted.

PROPOSED NEW BUILDINGS.

The same committee recommended that upon the acceptance of the deed to the property, bids be solicited for the erection of an eight class-room building, according to the plans and specifications of one of the architects formerly filed with the board. After a long discussion the report was referred back to the committee with instructions to make a recommendation as to the system of heating and ventilating to be adopted for the building.

The same committee recommended that an architect be employed to prepare plans for a twelve room building to be erected on the Isaac lot, in the Fifteenth ward, and that bids for the construction of the same be advertised for. This matter was also referred back to the committee for information as to heating and ventilating.

A NINE FEET FENCE.

The same committee recommended the building of a nine feet board fence between the Ninth District lot and the property adjoining on the west.

ORDERED ANNULLED.

The same committee also reported that in view of the instructions of the board, dated April 1st, the adoption of the report of your committee, dated March 8, 1892, recommending the purchase of lot 3, block 6, plat B, for the sum of \$6500, be rescinded. Adopted.
