

PIOCHE NOTES.

The following are from the Record of May 30 and 31—

Some of the Pioche stocks were on the rise yesterday.

Thirty tons of grain arrived yesterday from Lehi.

A large number of produce wagons arrived yesterday.

A heavy fog hung over the valley north of the city last night.

The various roads leading out of the city are reported to be in the best condition.

The narrow gauge railroad is now completed to the summit under the corrected survey.

Some of the immigrants from Southern California have, we are informed, located ranches down on the Muddy Valley.

Cherries are beginning to redden in the St. George orchards. The cultivators would do well bring a load to Pioche.

The cold snap has again set in motion the donkey wood transportation line. Cold weather is hardest on the poor donkeys.

The fruit trees on the Muddy—but few of them, however—are promising good yields this year.

The recent rains have been very beneficial to the crops up in the Snake Valley, settlers from there inform us.

A couple of Chinamen had a set-to in a fit of jealousy over a moon-eyed daughter of the flowery kingdom yesterday, but neither of them, unfortunately, was killed.

A practical miner told us yesterday that no good miners were necessarily out of employment here. But we think there are many good working men unable to find employment.

Mr. Johnson proposes to try to propagate brook trout in his wells, four miles from the city. We should think he could make a successful fish pond there.

Pritchard's fast-freight teams continue to arrive and depart with regularity. They usually come in heavily loaded.

Mr. Johnson, proprietor of the Fourmile Wells, will stock his large tank in the city with trout when the stock for the pond arrives. He has arranged to have them brought from the Sevier river.

The members of the G. A. R., of Salt Lake City, at a regular meeting, ordered, by resolution, that the money contributed by Brigham Young, and other leading Mormons, towards defraying the expenses of Decoration Day, be refunded to them, as "the acceptance of said contributions would be an insult to the memory of our fallen comrades." That don't detract from the credit due the Mormon contributors, but shows that G. A. R. of Salt Lake cannot appreciate the noble object of the new national holiday:

Being a Greek by birth, he can easily be identified when he reaches Salt Lake, and we advise the police of that city to keep a sharp eye on him. A man who would steal from his benefactors, as he did, is dangerous in any community.

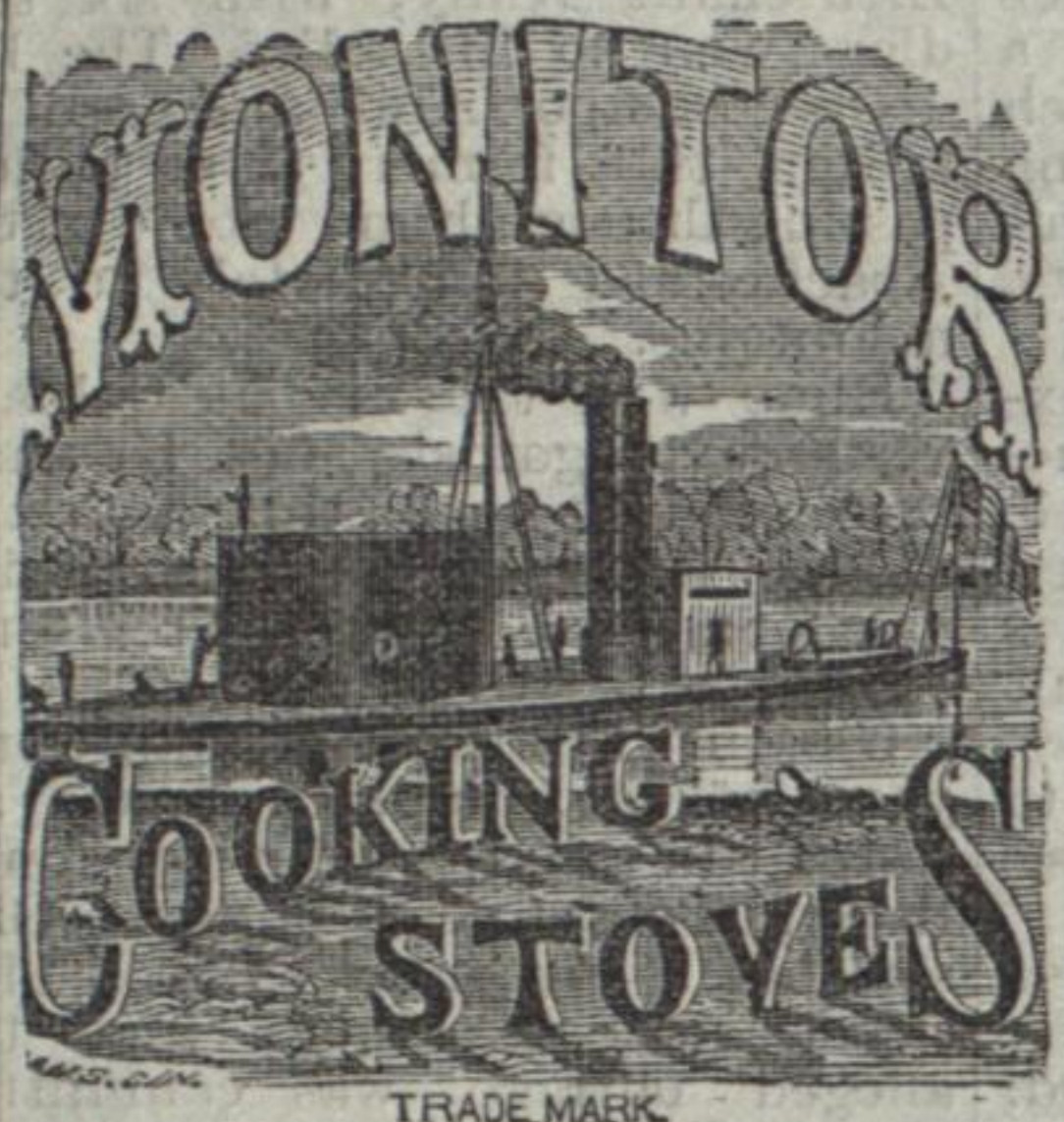

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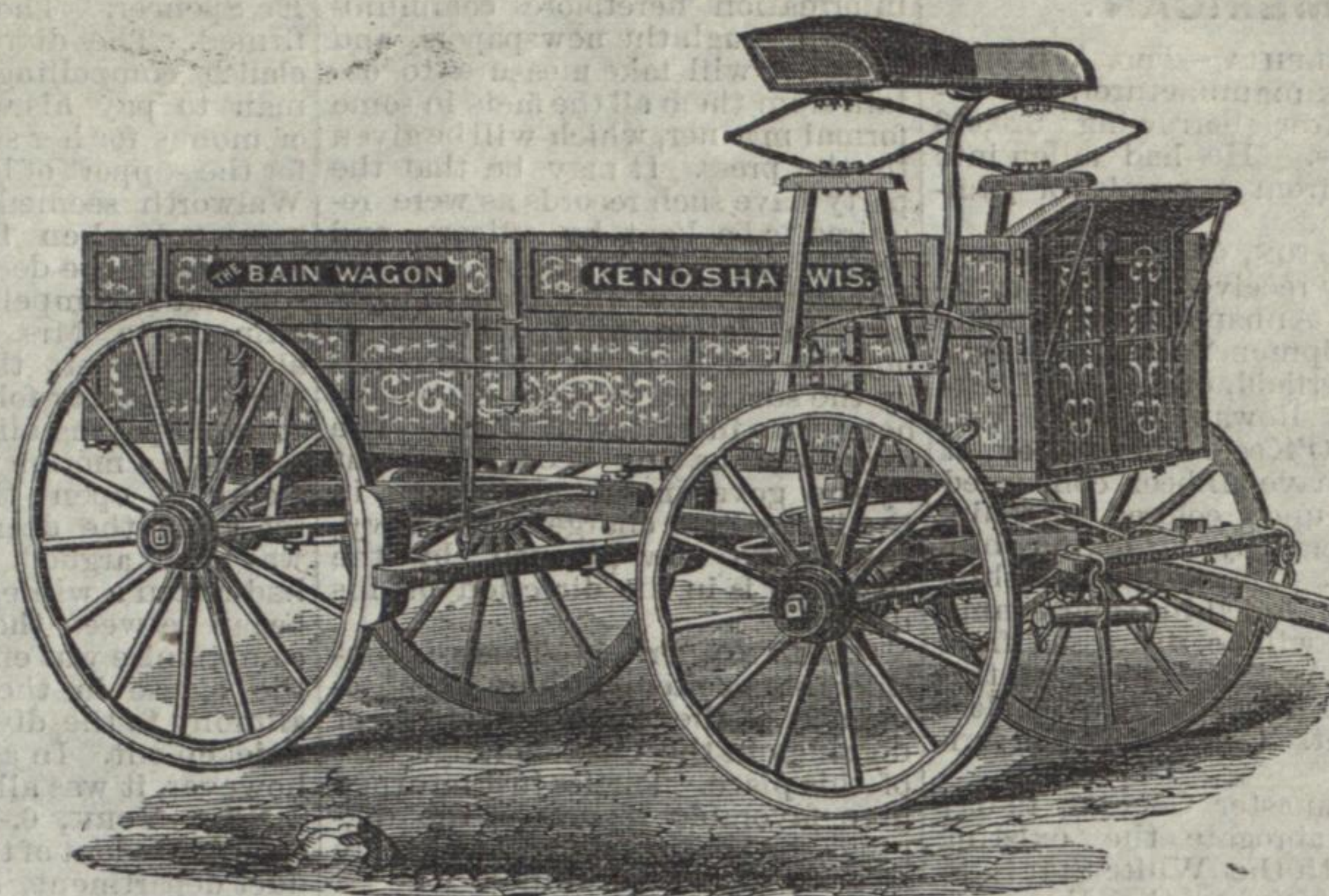

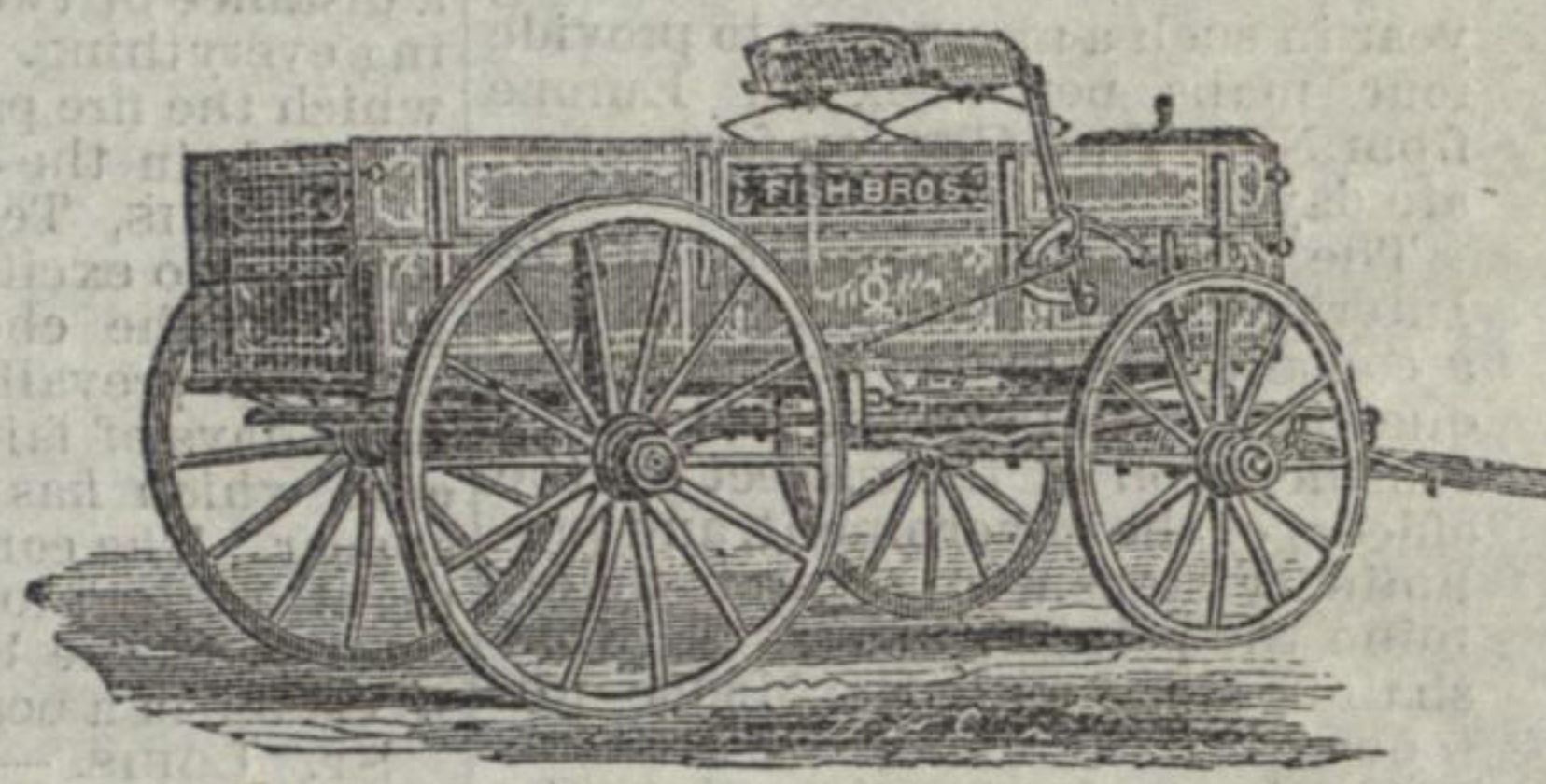
