## SALT LAKES VS LOBSTERS.

Is Yesterday's Games the Locals and Ogden Team Broke Even—Each Won a Game.

What has been daily expected for some time occurred yesterday afternoon at the game at Ogden, when the members of the Salt Lake team were handed their releases. The release now on hand is the same which has been mentioned several times in the "News," namely to reorganize the team, using Ogden players and play them for a purse of \$1,000. The whole matter is expected to be decided at tonight's meeting of the directors.
