The Mexican Border Troubles.

New York, 2.—The World's

Washington special says:

Commissions of investigation

into the Mexican border troubles

met, to-day, and heard the testi-

mony of Zamora, who is de-

scribed by Conkling as "a distin-

guished lawyer and member of the

Senate." Senator Patterson, who

was endeavoring to secure the recog-

nition of Diaz's government by the

United States, told the story of the

border troubles from a Mexican

point of view, claiming that the

Texans had caused outrages and

were responsible for a majority of the

hostilities which have been life

and property unsafe between Texas

and the Rio Grande. The com-

mittee decided that it will not visit

the border to prosecute its investiga-

tions.
