

GREAT DISRESPECT SHOWN PRESIDENT

When His Message on Secret Service Was Being Read Many Chuckled.

OTHERS LAUGHED OUTRIGHT.

Griggs of Georgia Moved That Message Be Returned to President—Referred to Committee.

Washington, Jan. 4.—Unusual attention was paid in the house of representatives today to the reading of a message from the president replying to a resolution of that body calling on him for an explanation of the intimation in his annual message that members of Congress were afraid to be investigated by the secret service. The galleries were packed. The president's specific references to certain speeches by Messrs. Tawney of Minnesota, Smith of Iowa, Sherely of Kentucky and Fitzgerald of New York, when the provision for the restriction of the operations of the secret service was up for discussion and also to Mr. Busbey, the speaker's private secretary, caused a storm of laughter. The speaker at times vigorously rapped for order. As the reading of the message proceeded, many of the members chuckled. Others laughed outright, while some were prone to joke with their neighbors. When the reading had been concluded, Mr. Perkins of New York, chairman of the special committee which originally considered the matter, moved that the message be referred to that committee. "Is an amendment in order to that motion?" inquired Mr. Griggs of Georgia, in a deliberate voice. "It is," replied the speaker. "Then," said Mr. Griggs, "I move that this message be returned to the president." "Oh, no," shouted several of Mr. Griggs' Democratic colleagues.

CONGRESS APPROPRIATES \$800,000 FOR ITALY

Washington, Jan. 4.—Bountiful provision for the earthquake sufferers of Italy was made by Congress today.

In the house there was vigorous handclapping as the bill carrying the appropriation of \$800,000 was passed almost immediately after the reception in both houses of a message from the president calling attention to the calamity. The president's signature was not affixed to the bill tonight, as it did not

reach him, but he will sign it tomorrow.

The fact that Congress was adjourned for the holidays prevented earlier action, although by the president's direction supplies aboard the naval ships *Celtic* and *Culgoa*, intended for the battleship fleet, were ordered delivered as quickly as possible.

As the prime minister of Italy believes that the American battleship fleet will arrive at the scene of the disaster too late to be of much assistance, consular agents are being held to rearrange their sailing program, as it is thought that their visit to several Italian ports will be ill-timed under the circumstances.

Consul Gato at Malta cabled the state department: "Have arranged with Vice Consul Lupton to co-operate with the Associated Press agents now in Messina in communicating the fate of all Americans to Malta as ascertained."

The American Red Cross already has collected a total of \$230,000. The American National Red Cross urges that, as far as possible, all contributions for Italian relief be sent through it, so that a complete record may be preserved of the amount contributed in the United States.

Should the theaters of the country desire to give performances for the benefit of the Italian relief fund the Red Cross will be glad to receive and forward the proceeds.

HYDE-BENSON SUITS.

Practically All of Them Dismissed by Judge Wolverton.

Portland, Or., Jan. 4.—Practically all the suits brought to the bench regular for the purpose of cancelling patents to the Hyde-Benson linen selections in this state were dismissed today by Judge Wolverton in the federal court, on motion of United States Atty. McCourt, on the ground that an investigation of the facts indicated that the "scrip" came into the possession of innocent purchasers, and was used by them without intention to defraud in the selection of other lands.

The action of the United States attorney in dismissing the suits against patents to the Hyde-Benson selections does not affect those cases where no patents have been issued.

MONTANA LEGISLATURE MEETS AND ORGANIZES

Helena, Mont., Jan. 4.—Not only were the recently elected state officials inducted into office at the capital here today with much ceremony, but the eleventh legislative assembly also assembled, and both houses immediately perfected organization by electing the various officials selected in the respective house. Democratic and senate Republican caucuses last night. W. W. McDowell of Butte was elected speaker; Edward Burke of Anaconda, speaker pro tem; Charles Pond of Roseman, chief clerk, and C. E. Blakely of Livingston, sergeant-at-arms, these officials being Democratic in politics. The Republicans voted for T. A. Cummings of Fort Benton for speaker. The Republican senators made Thomas Everett of Harlem president pro tem, and Nathan Godfrey of Helena, secretary.

Immediately after the administration of the oath to the newly-elected officers the legislature adjourned until tomorrow, when Gov. Norris will read his message before the joint assembly. The most imposing ceremony of the day perhaps was the induction into office of Gov. Edwin L. Norris, the oath being administered by Chief Justice Brantly before spectators, who, because of their great number, severely tested the capacity of the large reception room. This was followed by the administration of oath to the remaining state officials, including secretary of state, attorney-general, auditor, treasurer, superintendent of public instruction, and railroad commissioners, all these being Republicans.

Washington, Jan. 4.—The Ely National bank of Ely, Nev., capital \$25,000, was authorized to begin business today by the comptroller, A. B. Wheeler, president; Ned Munroe, cashier.

SHERIFF GOT HIS MAN.

Helena, Mont., Jan. 4.—A special to the Record from Lewistown says that in a battle between Deputy Sheriff Al Morgan and John Pfleger, in the Snowy mountain district, the latter was killed. Morgan has been on Pfleger's trail for several days.

COLORADO LAND CASES.

Second Lot of Suits Were Decided in Favor of Defendants.

Washington, Jan. 4.—The second batch of cases before the federal supreme court involving charges of defrauding the government out of large tracts of public lands in Colorado was decided today in favor of the defendants. The specific charge was conspiracy to defraud the government by conspiring to enter timber lands under the timber and coal act in excess of acreage permitted by that law.

Recalling the facts in the case, Justice White said: "Coming to consider the construction given by the court below to the allegations of the indictment, the correctness of the construction is established beyond controversy by the decision of the Williamson case, since the decision below was rendered. It is insisted by the government that however conclusive may be this ruling as to the power of the applicant to sell after an application and to perfect his entry for the purpose of enabling him to perform such contract, such ruling does not conclude the contention that a conspiracy formed to induce an entryman who has made his application to purchase subsequently to agree to convey his interest in the land would be a violation of the statutes. But we are constrained to say that this is a mere distinction without a difference."

Oakland, Cal., Jan. 5.—Two notes will of the eccentric millionaire, Joseph Boardman, were formally set aside yesterday by Judge Waite. These make three wills that have been set aside by court decree, and as no more

Washington, Jan. 5.—The federal grand jury yesterday returned an indictment against J. M. Waterbury charging him with false pretenses in securing money from Senator Burrows of Michigan and Representative Hull of Iowa and Barthold of Missouri as well as from Asst. Atty. Gen. Ormsby McHenry.

Waterbury is charged with having represented himself as an employee of the Associated Press and of having secured the money by pretending that it was the desire of the Associated Press to obtain photographs of the complainants. It was brought out at the hearing before the grand jury that Waterbury was not employed by the Associated Press and never had been.

TO IDENTIFY DESERTERS.

War Department Puts a New System Into Operation.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 4.—A new system of identifying deserters from the United States army has just been put into effect. The war department has been working on the matter for a year. This morning copies of the circulars which are a part of the new system were received at Fort Lawton. By means of these circulars every army post in the country will have a complete rogues' gallery of the deserters. As soon as a man enlists, his photograph is taken and sent on to Washington, while a full description of the man is sent to all the army posts. When a suspect is arrested he may be identified at once by reference to the rogues' gallery at the nearest army post.
