

Zuni Rain Dance. ZUNI, New Mexico, July 22nd, 1881.

Editor Deseret News:

After writing my last letter from here this morning, circumstances compelled me to remain over night, and I thereby had the satisfaction of witnessing the "Zuni Rain Dance." Two days previous a large party left for the surrounding hills to prepare sundown this evening they to their village and began their dance, which will con-tinue for several days. At the edge of the town they were met by the Governor and the Priest of the Rain, who placed his hand upon each of the dancers as they filed past in single file. There were 50 Indians, all dressed alike, with black masks and horse hair hanging from the masks reaching nearly to their knees; also six squaws dressed in uniform and six Indians dressed as clowns, having masks representing dogs, pigs, owls, etc. These marched in the rear. After filing past, they formed in one long line, and as twilight approached, lowering, threatening clouds were hanging around the horizon, the vivid chain forked lightning darted through the heavens, the distant thunder was rolling on in the distance, and hundreds of Indians could be seen upon the tops of their houses, which rise one above the other. The dance commenced first with a slow step, and low, slow singing, and the whirling of large shells in the air, which made a peculiar whizing sound; then in-creasing in tone and volume of sound until it almost drowned the sound of

the distant thunder, the dance went on increasing in interest to the spectator all the time, until time, place, and circumstances were forgot in witnessing the peculiar faith and devotion of these simple red men. In the course of half an hour the rain poured down in torrents, reminding one of Noah's flood, and causing us to seek shelter, and still these red men continued their dance, and as the rain poured down their zeal seemed to increase, and the scene altogether was wild, romantic, interesting, and will be long remembered by your correspondent. This dance will continue incessantly for two days, the dancers neither eating or drinking during that time, and they firmly believe this dance brings the

CITY ASSESSMENT, 1881. TO THE TAXPAYERS OF SALT LAKE CITY.

In accordance with the provisions of sections 15 and 16 of "An Ordinance to Provide for Assessing and Collecting City Taxes," passed March 12th, 1878, the City Council of Salt Lake City will sit as a Board of Equalization on Monday, August 29th, 1881, at 2 o'clock p. m., in the Council Chamber of the City Hell of said city, "to determine all complaints made in regard to the assessed value of any property," as assessed for city taxes for the year

During its session said Board will hear and consider any petitions which may be presented to "remit or abate the taxes of any insane, diotic, infirm or indigent person, to an amount not exceeding five dol lars for the current year," agreelars for the current year," agree-able to the provisions of said Ordi nance.


