

## HEARST ANNOUNCES HIS CANDIDACY

In New York Is Regarded as Severe Blow at Most Important Part of Tammany Ticket.

### IT SPLITS MAYORALTY VOTE.

His Supporters Reorganizing as Civic Alliance and Campaign Will Be Under That Name.

New York, Oct. 8.—The announcement of William H. Hearst that he would be a candidate for mayor of Greater New York is generally accepted as a severe blow to the most important part of the ticket nominated by Tammany Hall. Mr. Hearst's stipulation that the other candidates on the ticket which he will head must be the same candidates named on the Republican fusion ticket, will be accepted and this is taken to indicate that the nominees for comptroller and borough presidents being named by both the Hearst and Republican fusion tickets will poll a much heavier vote than the heads of their tickets.

When Tammany approved the candidacy of Judge Gaynor for mayor, it was commonly believed that the Democratic leaders cared little as to who would be mayor, and planned to accept a strong man, like Gaynor, to carry through the Tammany nominees for comptroller and borough presidents. The comptroller and borough presidents, with the president of the board of aldermen and the mayor, constitute the board of estimate and apportionment, which controls the finances of the city. Without the support of this board, the mayor is practically powerless. The board having such power that it can virtually dictate the mayor's policies.

### WHAT MOVE MEANS.

This move by Mr. Hearst means that the majority vote will be split in three ways, between Hearst, Gaynor and Hearst, while the votes for the members of the board of estimate will be divided among the Democratic nominees and those jointly supported by the strong Hearst following and the Republican fusion ticket.

Four years ago, when there were three entire tickets in the field, McCellan was elected mayor with 129,000 votes. Hearst polled 222,000. The Republican ticket was given 126,000. Had the Republican and Hearst tickets been combined, their total vote of 352,000 would have completely buried the Democratic ticket.

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many Hall from electing the members of the board of estimate. Sporting men who are always quick to wage money on the outcome of political campaigns, and who look at political moves from an unbiased viewpoint, were of the opinion that the Hearst candidacy weakens the individual chances of Otto T. Bannard, the Republican nominee, thus strengthening the individual chances of Gaynor, while it greatly strengthens the position of those candidates on the Republican fusion ticket for comptroller, president of the board of aldermen and borough presidents.

### HEARST'S STATEMENT.

Mr. Hearst's statement outlining the conditions upon which he will accept is in part as follows:

"Whether I am a candidate or not, I will support the rest of the fusion ticket nominated in opposition to Tammany Hall. When the Independent League committee withdrew from the fusion conference it declared that it still stood ready to support a frank and honest expression of progressive principles and candidates irrespective of party. This is your opportunity to substantiate that declaration. Nominate me, if you so desire, with the greatest part of that fusion ticket behind me and I will run."

The candidates nominated on the fusion ticket are worthy of support. The ticket is already in the field. If we nominate another ticket, both tickets may be defeated. If we nominate the fusion ticket, Tammany will be defeated. And if Tammany is defeated, the citizens will win."

Mr. Hearst goes on to say that he thinks his chances for election would be better on a straight independent ticket, but that he was not urging his personal chances alone, but rather of the city at large.

In other words, he wishes the endorsement of the independent to enable him to head a ticket simply by displacing Otto T. Bannard, who has been nominated by the regular Republican party and endorsed by the so-called fusionists. Mr. Hearst repudiated his endorsement of Justice Gaynor, the Democratic nominee, whom he announced several days ago he would support.

### COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS, JURIES INVESTIGATION

Chicago, Oct. 8.—One of the most important steps in the widespread investigation by State's Atty. Wayman into the alleged plot to tamper with Cook county juries was taken yesterday when a subpoena duces tecum was served upon the office of the jury commissioners for jury cards used in the circuit, superior and municipal courts in the last year.

Searching inquiry by Mr. Wayman has resulted in the discovery that bogus cards were used to cover up the scheme to "fix" juries. The names of the firms which printed the cards regularly used in drawing the names of veniremen in the office of the jury commissioners have been obtained, together with data, enabling the state prosecutor to distinguish these cards from all others, and, thereby, it is declared, a large number of counterfeit cards have been discovered.

Cards handled in the selection of veniremen for service in the criminal court in the last 12 months also will be scrutinized. It is his purpose to establish case after case where illegally obtained men were placed by juries to obtain verdicts favorable to certain interests or cause disgracements.

### ABDUL HAMID ATTEMPTS TO MAKE HIS ESCAPE

London, Oct. 8.—The Belgrade correspondent of the Telegraph says that Abdul Hamid, the deposed sultan of Turkey, has attempted to escape from his villa prison at Samsun. He is said to have had a workman brought in to do certain repairs. He professed to be annoyed at the man's dirty appearance and ordered him to take a bath before he did the work. While the man was bathing, his clothes were taken to Abdul Hamid, who donned them and passed from the garden into the street. There he was recognized by one of the guards and taken back.

### PARDONED HOMICIDE REMARRIES DIVORCED WIFE

Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 8.—John W. Neil, sentenced from Saline county to the penitentiary 10 years ago to serve 25 years for killing Cecil Waller, but who was pardoned last week, was remarried here yesterday to his former wife, who had obtained a divorce after his conviction and married Augustus Gaylord. Gaylord died two years ago.

### MURDEROUS ASSAULT AND SUICIDE IN BERLIN

Berlin, Oct. 8.—A murderous assault in Berlin last night upon an old woman well known to the night life of the capital, followed by the suicide of her assailant, came to light today when the Countess Augusta von Strachwitz died in a hospital.

The woman was shot and stabbed by Alfred Friedlander, a clerk 23 years old, who was intimate with her. After wounding the countess, the clerk committed suicide.

The dissolute life of the countess and her extravagant adventures made her notorious. Three years ago she issued two volumes of poems, entitled "Thoughts in Voice" and "Reveries."

It was never known whether or not the countess was the author of these works, and they were often attributed to a well known literary man.

### DESPISED LOVE.

Girl Lost Twenty-five Pounds and Wanted \$1,000 a Pound Damages.

## SUDDEN RECALL OF MINISTER CRANE

Has Little Fear of Any Reprimand At Hands of the State Department.

### IN FULL HARMONY WITH TAFT

When He Has Spoken on Various Occasions It Has Been With the President's Approval.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—The Tribune today prints an interview with Charles C. Crane, the new minister to China, which reads in part:

Charles C. Crane, now on his way from San Francisco to Washington in response to a sudden recall on the eve of his departure for the orient, has little fear of a reprimand at the hands of the state department.

Referring to published reports that his recall was for the purpose of reproving him for a too free discussion of diplomatic relations between this country and China, Mr. Crane let it be known that what he has said on several occasions since his appointment was with the sanction and approval of President Taft.

He is of the opinion that the communication from the state department which arrested his departure has nothing to do with speeches which have been suggested as causes of official displeasure.

Mr. Crane said in answer to questions:

"I am in the dark so far as concerns the nature of this recall. I got a brief message from Mr. Knox, directing me to report at Washington once more before sailing for China. I do not think the summons is for the purpose of giving the state department opportunity to criticize recent public utterances of mine. It is most probable that things have come up which necessitate consultation and conference. It is generally understood that the situation in the far west is at a delicate juncture."

"The papers have pointed out that the secretary may wish advice against a repetition of such speeches as were delivered in New York, Chicago, and other places after I received my appointment. Following the receipt of cordial invitations to make addresses before various organizations, I went to President Taft and told him I did not consider myself fit to accept them. He told me to go ahead and do the best I could, and for that end I have striven."

"Mr. Taft knows that I am in sympathy with the policies to which he has given his public endorsement. As I left San Francisco I learned that the president had been notified of my recall, but he too, was in ignorance as to its cause."

### ALT-AZIMUTH STUMPED TREASURY AUTHORITIES

Washington, Oct. 8.—"What's an alt-azimuth?" asked the authorities in the office of the comptroller of the treasury, and recourse to the dictionary was required before they were willing to pass upon an account of the naval observatory. Then they approved a voucher for \$70, under the contingent appropriation fund, for services in "re-grading on gold the alt-azimuth circles and new scores and the heads in four microscopes of alt-azimuth circles."

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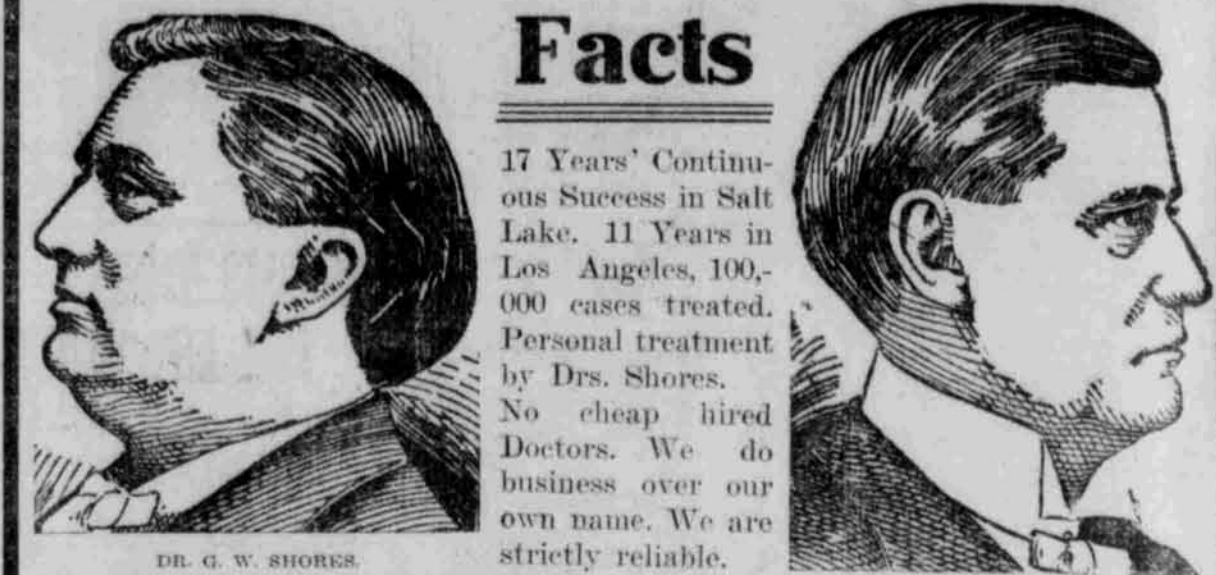
