Constantinople, 21.-The Porte has addressed a note to Sir Austin Layard, British ambassador, in re-ply to Potter's ultimetum on the subject of the prosecution of Koe-ler, German missionary, for dis-tributing religious tracts. The Porte argues that the proceedings of Koeler justified the seizure of his papers, which were only return-ed out of regard for England. That Ambed Tewfix, Mahommedan priest, deserves the punishment awarded him in conformity with the religious laws of the country, and that he was at lib erty only by clemency of consul. In conclusion the Ports expresses satisfaction at the resumption of official relations with the British ambassador. Sir Austin Layard will reply to the note, declaring he does not accept the principle that a foreigner may be arrested, provided his am-bassador be infermed within 24 hours, he will refute the arguments hours, he will refute the arguments of the Porte on the religious aspect of the case as contrary to the stipu-lations of article 63 of the treaty of Berlin.
