THEATER RALLIES CLOSE CAMPAIGN

Two Speeches at Salt Lake and Lyric on the Local Situation.

THEME IS BRYAN AND KNIGHT

Judge O. W. Powers and Hon. B. H. Roberts Tell Hearers How They Think Peace Can Come.

With the near approach of election day, the tendency to rally once again after the schedule of rallies had run out, proved too strong for Democratic orators and they held two impromptu rallies Saturday evening.

While the "American" party flag parade was in progress, the Democrats decided upon a Salt Lake theater rally and a Lyric theater rally, and sent riders to the people watching the parade.

The speakers were O. W. Powers and B. H. Roberts, who had been speaking steadily for a week without intermission. Mr. Powers addressed those at the Lyric; Mr. Roberts those at the Salt Lake theater.

The theme of both addresses was the matter of bringing "peace to Utah" and the consideration of ways and means to do it that would include Democratic victory in nation and state.

Charging that political instructions had been issued in religious gatherings, Mr. Roberts pointed to what he said was a grave crisis in Utah politics, speaking of its alleged approach as follows:

"Since the Democratic party since its inception has always resisted such interference as this, whether it be secret or open, I am here this evening to enter my protest against such a proceeding. I wish to enter this protest not in a spirit of bitterness and not to awaken a spirit of revenge. The occasion that has arisen puts the question beyond a point where we may indulge in bitterness."

The proposition that I propose to discuss is this, that there exists now in Utah more than ever before, the need of preserving the political identity

of the two great national parties. I regard as the greatest calamity that could befall this state the abolition of the political parties and the creation of the Mormon and non-Mormon parties. Such a calamity would throw the state back a quarter of a century."

"In 1892, when I first spoke from a party platform for the principles of Democracy, I said that I hoped that the time would soon come when in politics we would never be forced to utter the names Mormons and between and to make a distinction between them, but we should refer to each other as citizens of the United States. That time has been long in coming, and I do not wonder that some of you have become impatient, that some of you have been despaired of a solution of the problem. To you I say, that it is my solemn belief that in the Democratic party is found that solution."

JUDGE POWERS AT LYRIC.

Judge Powers followed B. H. Roberts at the Salt Lake theater, and Mr. Roberts followed Judge Powers at the Lyric. Statesman Sam. A. King presided at the Salt Lake theater and spoke briefly between the two speeches.

Judge Powers, first at the Lyric, and then at the Salt Lake theater, gave his views of the issue. When challenged by an aged man in the theater audience he did not wonder that some of you have become impatient, that some of you have been despaired of a solution of the problem. To you I say, that it is my solemn belief that in the Democratic party is found that solution."

In an argument on constitutional ideals, Judge Powers said that the government "was founded on the individuality of men and women of mature years. It is the result of a deep yearning for liberty among all peoples. Throughout the ages people struggled against the tyranny of kings and priests, but it remained for the new world to create and maintain a government for the people, of the people, and by the people."

"A deep responsibility rests upon each voter. He is the one to decide how he shall exercise his franchise. It becomes his duty to act according to the dictates of his own conscience. All men are free and equal, not in brains, not in strength, not in ability, but before the law. When a man votes at the dictation of others, he does not voice the will of the people. The nine points of the Democratic declaration of principles, adopted after the reconvened convention, were read and considered each by itself."

Judge Powers, after going over the entire local field, closed with an appeal for peace, and a statement that he has, through many years of Utah political warfare, hoped finally to end his days in peace and quietude in the state where his mature life has been spent.

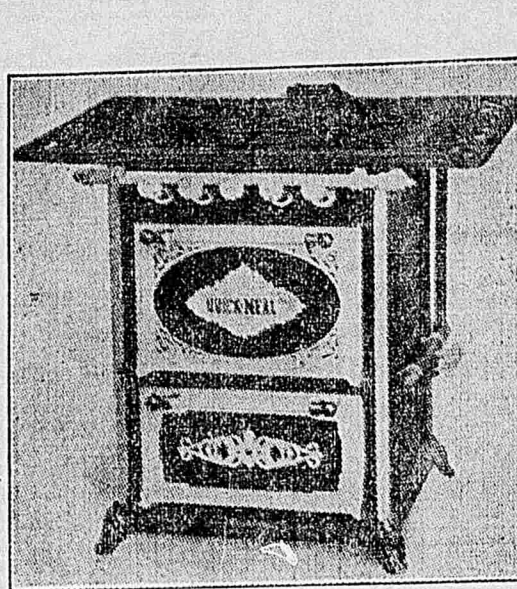
