Sec. 7. No rebate shall be allowed upon any license, unless in case wherein the party or parties to whom a license has been issued has been damaged by fire or other unforeseen accident; or unless in case of affliction or poverty. And in such cases the Council shall have discretionary power as to what, if any, amount shall be rebated.

Sec. 8. In any action brought under or arising out of the provisions of this ordinance the fact that the party thereto represented himself or herself as engaged in any business or calling for the transaction of which a license is by city ordinance required, or that such party exhibit a sign indicating such business or calling, shall be conclusive evidence of the liability of such party to pay for a license.

Sec. 9. That section 41 of chapter XXIII of said "Revised Ordinances," relating to merchant's license, be and is hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance be and the same are hereby repealed.

Sec. 11. This ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1892.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Board of Education met in regular session November 19, Preet. Scott in the chair. The trustees present were Messrs. Pike, Duke, Alf, Nelson, Newman, Raybould, Colbath, Young, Baldwin and Pratt.

COLBATH RESIGNS.

Mr. Colbath sent in his resignation in the following language:

I herewith tender my resignation as a member of your honorable body, and beg you to accept the same without delay. My business prevents my giving the time required to attend to the duties.

The resignation was accepted.

SITE COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

The committee on sites and buildings reported the erection and completion of the two class rooms and six cloak rooms at the Seventh school, and find the same done in accordance with the plans and specifications. The work has been accepted by the architect and your committee recommend that the final payment be made to the contractors, and also that the commission due the architect be paid. Also reported that a first class gardener had been employed to grade and gravel around the entire school buildings, to cut out shade trees, etc., at a cost of about \$50. We have also contracted to have all the outside woodwork of the old buildings painted, the wood partition on two sides of the recitation room painted and calomined, and the new portion of the fence painted, all for the sum of \$45. Adopted.

DICKERT'S RELIEF MAPS.

H. Hirsching offered to supply the board with Dickert's relief maps of Utah at the following rates: Five pieces at \$15; ten pieces at \$14; fifteen pieces at \$13; twenty pieces at \$12. Committee on school work.

AN INDIGNANT DENIAL.

Hamel Pratt sent in a communication in which he indignantly denied that he or any other Republican had taken forcible possession of the Eleventh ward school house recently for political purposes. Received and filed.

STEAM RADIATORS.

Midgley & Sons proposed to furnish the school houses with radiators, complete with valves, etc., at \$44 each. The work was ordered done at once. Received and filed.

A VOTE OF THANKS.

A communication was received from Recorder Jack stating that the city council had agreed to grant no liquor license to saloons within twenty rods of any school. On motion a vote of thanks was tendered the council.

FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL PURPOSES.

Mrs. J. J. Corum asked permission to use the school rooms in the Whitney building on Eighth West street for a Sunday school on Sunday afternoons. Referred.

DRINKING FOUNTAINS.

The privilege to erect drinking fountains in front of the school buildings was granted.

ADDITIONAL ROOM.

The committee on sites and buildings reported that it was considered necessary in order to successfully con-

duct the business of the board, to secure additional room for the officers and members. An effort had been made to secure rooms in the Roberts & Ellerbeck building, but as that could not be done, other quarters had been looked up. Rooms could be secured in the Hooper & Eldredge building at the same rent paid for the rooms now occupied. The party from whom the board was now leasing, however, was unwilling to cancel the lease, which ran until September 1, 1892, without some compensation. The committee recommended that they be given authority to lease the rooms in the Hooper & Eldredge building and fit them up, and to procure the cancellation of the present lease. Adopted.

ISSUANCE OF NOTES AUTHORIZED.

The same committee reported having visited Mrs. Emma Fenton, William Buttle and James H. Poulton, obtained their consent to procure abstracts of title and their acceptance of the terms of purchase of the three school sites authorized by the Board at its last meeting. The abstracts had been examined by Attorney Williams, who reported them all right, and the committee recommended that the sum of \$3500 be appropriated to pay the installments on the purchase of this property and that notes be executed with the seal of the Board, the action having first been authorized by a resolution to Mrs. Fenton for \$4000, to Mr. Buttle for \$2500 and to Mr. Poulton for \$2000, all payable on or before six months with 8 per cent. interest; that on payment of the installments and the delivery of the notes, the committee be authorized to place the deeds on record; also that a lease be made with Mr. Poulton, leasing to him the house he now occupies for the consideration of \$1, until April 1, 1892.

The report, and a resolution authorizing the issuance of notes, were adopted.

PLANS PERFECTED.

The same committee also reported having spent considerable time with Architect Kietting in getting plans perfected for an addition to the Eleventh school, and recommended that the plans be accepted; also that bids for the erection of the addition as soon as possible be solicited, each bidder to furnish a certified check for 10 per cent. of the amount. The committee also asked for authority to solicit bids for the erection of the Sixth school building, in accordance with the plans of Monhelm, Bird & Proudfoot. Adopted.

POWER TO EXECUTE.

P. L. Williams, the board's attorney, reported that the board had the power to execute promissory notes for the purchase of school sites, etc. Adopted.

NIGHT SCHOOL RULES.

The following rules pertaining to night school were approved:

First—The following classes of persons shall be eligible to membership in the school: Pupils whose age is above 14 and under 18 and whose circumstances will not permit of their attendance at day schools; and persons above the legal school age, who are desirous of availing themselves of the advantage of such school.

Second—Each person on registering for attendance shall deposit the sum of \$2
