This will be of especial interest to the people there, as it will be the first time in 200 years that the king and queen of England have together visited Bristol.

U., a program will be given in honor of Jennie Cassidy, who founded the flower mission work, and flower distribution among prisoners will be planned. Mrs. L. M. Gas Company Will Pay—The matter of the payment of a claim held by the city against the Utah Gas & Coke company, for \$1,200 inspection fees for work done in laying mains for the gas company and the work of inspection for which was done by the city, has been amicably adjudicated, and the company has signified its willingness to pay the bill with the exception of \$15, which amount is still in dispute. For a long time the company refused to pay the city's bill for inspection services.

FORECAST OF COUNCIL

Signs, As Unreliable as Weather Signals, Indicate Possible Action on The Bond Issue.

The council may take another "try" at the \$600,000 bond issue at its meeting tonight, and then again it may not. It depends upon the "signs." If the wind is in the east, Councilman Perry may be expected to call the matter up and put it through; but if a cold nor'wester be blowing and Councilman Black has a threatening look, or if Councilman Stewart or President Davis mayhap are not present, then Councilman Perry may be expected to once again make the original motion that the bond ordinance "lay over another week."

It looks like Black and the whip hand, and his \$400,000 proposition has developed extremely "sneaky" indications among the plotters of the "inner circle."

Councilman Martin may also climb onto a high horse over the veto by Mayor Branford of his resolution providing for the purchase of a new combination fire hose cart, and the city council may be expected to work very hard on this matter, and through correspondence get the factory to come down in its figures from \$1,525, the original price of the wagon, to \$1,100. After all this the mayor, who is not likely to be a doer, just now, and then, again he did not think it his duty to call the council to order, may try to do it.

It is possible that the council may reach the streetcar ordinance tonight. Asst. City Atty. P. J. Daly prepared the ordinance and insists that the city has the right to regulate the use of streetcars by the railroad company, and although the attorney for the railroad people calmly will be entirely void and of no effect, it is intimated that the council will endeavor to try its hand, anyhow, just for luck.

Salt Lake City Threatened With an Invasion Which is Distinctly Unwelcome to Ice Men.

Salt Lake City is threatened with an invasion of an ice cream soda trust, affecting 75 soda fountains in the city among a total of 400 fizzy drink places in which it is figured an operating saving of \$40,000 will be made each year in Utah.

That is, unless the United States government heeds the protests that are arising from sodawater fountain makers of the country, and with a court injunction stops the monopoly that will result from adding the iceless soda fountain to recently commercialized discoveries. The fountain manufacturers are planning a meeting in Chicago to call for federal intervention in protection of their business.

The uneasiness of the fountain makers has resulted from discovery by the Chicago newspapers of plans said to have been completed by L. A. Becker company of Chicago to monopolize America's soda fountain business. The company has declined to discuss the monopoly charge and refuses photographs any view of the new device. Ice manufacturers are taking lively interest in the contemplated trust proceedings to thwart the iceless fountain monopoly, because the effect of general introduction will have on their business. It is estimated that the saving to soda dispensers will amount to \$10,000,000 a year. A total of more than 75,000 soda fountains will be affected in the United States, and in every city, it is estimated, the profits of the ice trust will be cut deep.

A Washington dispatch states that on July 1, the Cache and Pocatello national forests will be established as objects being to simplify administrative matters. The Cache forest will consist of the Logan and Idaho divisions of the Snake river national forest, and will be administered by Sup't. Woodruff with headquarters at Logan, Utah. The Pocatello national forest will consist of the present Pocatello and Idaho national forests, together with the Malad division of the Bear river forest. These areas will be administered by Supervisor Wrenstedt, with headquarters at Pocatello, Idaho.

ELATERITE CASKETS PROPOSED

There is a proposition to establish in this city an elaborate burial casket factory involving the expenditure of \$150,000 by E. H. Serman and M. D. Giffin of Butte, and W. E. Hubbard of Salt Lake. Elaterite is an indestructible, entirely impervious to the disintegrating processes which buried wood is subject to, and can only be affected by heat. But through a process invented by Mr. Giffin, the elaterite casket is not affected by even that. The casket is air tight, so that after the air is exhausted by an air pump, the body in time becomes mummified.
