CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

Washington, 18.—On motion of Ed-
munds an indefinite leave of absence
was granted to Grimes on account of
illness.

Buckalew rose to a question of privi-
lege. He spoke at considerable length,
bitterly commenting on the proceedings
of the House in reference to the Senate,
saying the House had recently under-
taken to protect not only the interests
committed to them, but also the dignity
and honor of the Senate. He said the
Senate is competent to preserve, pure
and unsullied, the streams of public
justice so far as it is concerned therein.

Sumner defended the conduct of the
House. Doolittle moved that the Senate
respectfully decline to furnish the pub-
lic its records, and that it ask the House
to furnish such facts as they may have
touching the alleged improper influ-
ences, etc.; disagreed to. Question was
then taken on the motion to furnish
the records asked for, yeas 109, nays 6.
Senate adjourned for Thursday.

HOUSE.

Chicago, 19.—The conclusion of the
congressional proceedings was received
at a late hour this morning. Stevens
offered a resolution, requesting the
Senate to send the House an official
copy of the last two days proceedings of
the court of impeachment. An ex-
citing debate occurred, during which
Stevens said that he had no accusation
to make against any Senator, but that
there had been a deed of damnation
committed, nobody could doubt, and he
wanted an opportunity to see who was
guilty and who not.

Ross asked whether Senators would
have been justified in perjuring them-
selves to secure the conviction of the
President? Stevens replied he did not
think it would have hurt them much.
The resolution was finally adopted.

A resolution was offered amending
the Constitution so as to make foreign-
ers who have resided in this country
fourteen years eligible to the Presidency.

Banks from the committee on For-
eign Affairs, reported a bill appropriat-
ing \$7,250,000 to carry out the treaty
for the purchase of Alaska. Washburne
of Wisconsin presented a minority re-
port signed by himself and Morgan
declaring that the country alluded to is
of no value to the United States and it
is inexpedient to appropriate money for
its purchase. The bill and the report
were ordered printed, Banks giving
notice that he would not ask action be-
fore the second week in June.

GENERAL.

Washington.—It is understood that
Hon. Daniel W. Voorhies, Perry and
Fuller, of Kansas and Gen. Ewing have
been summoned as witnesses by the Im-
peachment Managers.

San Francisco 20.—Among the pas-
sengers, by the *New York* from Japan,
are two natives of high rank, refugee
adherents of the Tycoon. They will
study our language and institutions un-
til it is safe to return.

Chicago.—The *Republican's* Wash-
ington special states that recent devel-
opments give the strongest encourage-
ment to the belief that when another
vote is taken, the necessary number of
Senators will vote for conviction on
the second and some of the other articles.

Chicago.—Grant has been nominated
unanimously; the nomination for Vice-
President is now being made.

Colfax is nominated Vice-President
on the 5th ballot.

EDITORIAL SUMMARY.

The traffic in female virtue is one of
the most disgusting and hideous devel-
opments of the social system of the
Christian world, and no stronger indi-
cation of its rottenness and corruption
can be given. Christians of all denomi-
nations have been shocked at the
written accounts of the trade in female
charms carried on between the Orientals
and the Circassians. But when, some
years ago, disclosures began to be made
occasionally, of a traffic of a like nature
being carried on between England and
some portions of the Continent of
Europe, virtuous indignation reached
its highest point, and anathemas loud
and strong were pronounced upon the
heads of those most foul, disgusting and
filthy of all satan's agents—the pro-
cureurs and her employees. Despite these
denunciations from press and pulpit,
this vile crusade against virtue found
