

CONDITIONS IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Judge Smith of the Commission **Reports They Are Gener**ally Satisfactory.

TOO SOON FOR SELF-CONTROL

Many of Filipinos' Misgivings Allayed But They Are Still Very Watchful.

San Francisco, April 13.-Judge Jas. F. Smith, a member of the Philippine commission and prospective governorgeneral of the islands, arrived coday on the steamer Mongolia. The governor-to-be is in excellent health. He is here on a vacation and will remain in America until Aug. 1. Mrs. Smith accompanied him. He telegraphed President Roosevelt today of his arrival.

MUST CAPTURE LADRONES.

sudge Smith reported the islands to be in a peaceful condition, with the exception of minor local disturbances due to the activities of two fugitive iadrone chiefs who are stirring up dis-content. "I cannot see the reason, if the Is-lands are part of the United States, why Filipino tobacco should not be admitted here free of duty. The re-moval of the tax on tobacco would be an excellent move for both the mother country and the islands. This would give the Philippines the Con-mentionic heaf for wranners instead of necticut leaf for wrappers instead of forcing the Filipino cigarmakers to buy Sumatra leaf from the Germans.

COMPETITION A BUGABOO.

"The people of the United States need not fear connectition that would arise from the repeal of the tobacco tax. The sections where the highgrade weed can be cultivated in the islands are very few. Wherever the salt air or fogs penetrate the fields the tobacco leaf becomes spotted and of inferior quality. In the islands, the valleys that are absolutely sheltered from these climatic influences are very few, hence the production of superior grade of the plant is confined to a small area.

JAPAN AND ISLANDS.

The reports of the probable pur-chase of the islands by Japan were belittled by Judge Smith. "It is my personal opinion," he said, "that there is a question whether Congress would have authority to so dispose of the is-lands without the source of the islands without the sanction of the peo-ple at large. These reports have disple at large. These reports have dis-turbed the Filipinos to some extent, and they become disgruntled over the rumored prospect of becoming sub-jects of the Japanese emperor.

"The attitude of the American government toward the people of the Phil-ippines is to create the impression that when they are ready for self-gov-ernment they will be given their independence, but America must be first assured that they are ready to main-tain their autonomy. REPORTS OF DISTURBANCES IN CHINA EXAGGERATED.

San Francisco, April 12.-Bishop J. W. Bashford of the Methodist Episcopal church, who has been four years at Shanghai, arrived from the orient to-day. Bishop Bashford for 15 years was president of the Ohio Wesleyan univer-sity. He is en route to Chicago to at-tend the semi-annual meeting of the board of Episcopal bishops, Concerning conditions in China, Bishop Bashford said:

"The reports of the disturbances in China have been greatly exaggerated in the United States. There have been three riots in the empire since the in-auguration of the American boycott a year ago. In the Shanghai riot not a foreigner was killed, a though a score or more of natives lost their lives at the hands of foreigners, and 40 or 50 more were wounded. At Liengchon fiv, Americans were killed. At Nanchang six French subjects and three English sub-jects were killed, and a day or two fol-lowing the riot more than a score of Chinese lost their lives in a wild stam-pede made by them to escape through the gates and on boats, on reports that foreign gunboats were coming to de-The reports of the disturbances in
