

TELEGRAPHIC. JOHN AND THE LAW.

How the Chinese Evade the Gary Act at New York.

THE FIRST TO BE REPORTED.

A Proposition to Extend the Time in Which to Register Ancestral Year.

New York, Sept. 10.—The provisions of the Chinese exclusion law are practically nullified at this port. In nine cases out of ten those seeking admittance pass the ordeal of examination and investigation. Collector Elizur H. In the same time over twenty cases have reached New York and since the first of the year about seventy-five. The Chinese are anxious to get registered, as they are compelled to do so, in the capacity of "police" or "advisors" or among the "returnees" of the mandarin. Who is to blame? Who is to blame? The system of communication kept up between New York and Havana is perfect, and if an unusual question is put to the applicants of today which they cannot answer, in two weeks' time every incoming Chinese can be found and sent back.

THE RACE TO BE DIVORCED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—The first Chinese to have their sentence of separation from their wives pronounced as executed arrived in San Francisco from Los Angeles yesterday, and are now confined in the county jail, where they will be detained until Tuesday, when they will be sent to the Chinese section of the Chinese City. There are five Chinese in the batch, and they came to charge of United States Marshal Gott, who will see them on board the steamer and will not leave them until he has the captain's receipt for them.

The news that these Chinese had arrived in the city and would be placed on the steamer leaving Tuesday evening caused a stir in the future and many for an extension of time in which to allow them to register. In view of the recent developments this subject is creating much interest here, though there seems no possibility of any extension of time, the Chinese must be sent to the Chinese.

A PROPOSED EXTENSION OF TIME.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—It is probable that the protest of the Chinese against the proposed extension of the Garry exclusion law will be repeated, and that legislation may be enacted which will amend the existing law by extending the limit allowed for registration, although in an unwise manner. The position of the Chinese assumed by this government as to the constitutionality of the measure. The new Chinese minister arrived at the national capital last week, and since that time has been in constant communication between the President and his cabinet and the representatives of the Chinese government.

The result of these conferences is that Congressmen Everett of Massachusetts may introduce in the House a bill which would amend the legislation on Garry May 1, 1893, as Sept. 1, 1894. The effect of the bill, if enacted into law, will be to practically nullify the Garry law until December 1, 1895, when it will go into effect with all the original force. It is thought, however, that the Chinese, through their minister, will restore cordial relations between the United States and China.

THE CHINESE IN NEW YORK.

CHINESE PROTEST.

In the House there is nothing of importance on the horizon for the coming week except from the ways and means, banking committee and agriculture committees, and the bill presented under the resolution passed when the committees were convened. None of the other House committees have had a meeting. Not a bill has been reported. This leaves the chamber without a calendar.

INDIAN RESERVATIONS.

Motions of Accra for Land for Indian Brothers.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 8.—The opening of two more Indian reservations is under consideration at the Interior department. The opening of the Chinese reservation, Indian territory, has already been made, and the Indians are now being moved to the new. The testimony is a single individual. He Was Buried Beneath the Floor of the Jail.

WASHPINGTON, Sept. 10.—Deputy Sheriff Hiram C. Miller, of the Marion County jail, the assassin of President Garfield, is not on exhibition at the Medical Museum, as has been generally supposed, great precautions were taken to prevent the grave from being disturbed.

In order to insure that legal difficulties might arise and prevent any claim the sister or brother of the murderer might make to the body, it was decided to bury it in the jail. The night of the hanging, after the autopsy, the body remained in a cheap casket, and was taken to the jail on the Saturday morning following the execution, a couple of troopers proceeded to the laundry room to the east of the engine room, dimly lighted by a small barred grating, and made about an hour's search. The body was found lying on the floor, with its hands tied behind its back, and the fingers tightly gripping the clothing, being a glove sufficiently dead.

At the time the body had been buried down from the surface and the grave was not permitted to receive the funeral services. There was only a small party that stood about that open grave and listened to the solemn reading of the burial service. Her face was severely beat and her eyes were closed. She was found with an attack of gout, which was followed by strangulation.

The two men who participated in the robbery were identified as Tim McCarthy, alias, and Tom McCarthy, alias, son of Tim McCarthy. These men constituted the McCarthy gang of Oregon, who were wanted there for robbing stage and the United States mail. There is a reward of \$10,000 offered for the apprehension of these men.
