Ising ten or fifteen miles southeast of Loa, Wayne Co. On the east lies a wide expanse of desert, which dazzles the eyes when the sun is beating fierce-

In the midst of this great desolate solitode, clothed in the blue robe lent by distance, rises the Henry mountains

-bold and impressive-as if proud of their superiority over the scenes about

On the west lies a beautiful plateau.

studded with patches of aspens and evergreens, while occasionally the eye catches a silvery lake a winding stream

catches a silvery lake a winding stream or a piensant little village. After ascending a few rugged steeps we find ourselves on top the 'Bouider.' Gaining a point of view we behald a sight which, at once, entrances all lov-ers of the picturesque. Another elevated plateau about fif-teen miles long and fourteen miles wide, which is gently fanned by a pleasant, cool breeze, when the July sun is lit-erally burning things on the desert be-low. 'We see stretches of stately pines, open meadows, and hundreds of glassy lakes whose wave crests seem to be set with myriads of sparkling diamonds. The grass, the flowers, the bushes and

The grazes, the flowers, the bushes and the pines when rocked by the breze, send through the air an odor which must appeal to the deadest sense. If when looking over the beautiful meadows you could see occasionally a bunch of cows or a pretty milk maid.
