The following is an extract from a private letter recently received from England: 100 101

"Charles Kean, the tragedian, has recently died, and his life had sufficient importance to call from the press generally an elaborate obituary. Of those papers whose remarks I have read not one has traced his descent further back than his father, Edmund Kean. They have all ignored the great forefather from whom, after a lapse of one hundred years, he derived the inspiration (though sadly diluted) which made him what he was.

"In the reign of the Stuarts, and William, Prince of Orange, 'the first statesman, in genius, was George Saville, Marquis of Halifax, gifted with eloquence and conversation, overflowing with thought, fancy and wit, an intellect fertile, subtle and capacious, a writer of political tracts, whose literary merits entitle him to a place among English classics.' He was the most brilliant and far-seeing man of his age. His wonderful foresight, 'by which he saw passing events, not in the point of view in which they commonly appear to one who bears a part in them, but in the point of view in which, after the lapse of many years, they appear to the philosophic historian, rendered it impossible for him to act long with any political party, and thus to many of his contemporaries he appeared to be a man without principles, an actor, and was called, in the slang of the day, a trimmer. He left a natural son, Henry Carey, a successful dramatic author and the writer of 'gay and spirited verses, some of which still live in the memory of hundreds of thousands' (God save the King, &c., among them.) From Henry Carey descended Charles Kean, weakened by transmission through more than one hundred years. The great yersatility of genius and peculiar turn of mind which made Halifax seem an actor cropped out at last in making two of his descendants, both men of mark in their walk, real actors. Compared with the theatre which their great ancestor charmed, their stage was small, their audience nobodies, their life a sham; but still there is a resemblance.
