Front and back gores are piped with black satin and trimmed with numbers of tiny black buttons and simulated buttonholes of soutache. The waist is arranged so that the button-trimmed front seems like a continuation of the front skirt gore broken at the waistline with a crushed girdle. The sleeves are diminutive puffs of the silk gathered into a piped and button-trimmed cuff, this finished with a lace cuff matching the lace chemise, with braiding of silver soutache.
