It was 8:15 when the City Council was called to order by Mayor Scott last night. The following motion was referred back for a better description of property. Referred to the board of public works.

The motion was voted to waive the request for the application of Frank Stanley as special policeman, reported favorably on the petition. Adopted.

From the Board of Public Works:

The board of public works transmitted with their opinion the following resolution of the city engineer in favor of it:

District S. Williams, work done and material furnished on Patten's dam and outlet for July, \$11,000; Hobson & Wimberly, work on Miller's Park, \$1,000; materials and labor on water main during July, \$1,000; J. A. Moore, laying tiles, \$1,000; various contracts during July, \$1,000; amount and date of payment during July, \$1,000. Total amount of estimates, \$10,000. Adopted.

Judge Gandy voted in the following report of business transacted by July 1:

Business of various kinds, \$1,000; cash received from the city engineer, \$1,000; amount and date of payment during July, \$1,000.

Adopted.

NOTES AGAINST CITY.

The committee on legislation, to whom was referred the petition of S. F. Walker in regard to a spring on his property on Fifth South street, recommended that the measure be referred to the committee on franchises. Adopted.

1000 TAX PAYERS.

The Tax Collector offices reported that he had collected \$10 tax to the amount of \$240 during the month of July. Adopted.

H. V. Huntington asked for an electric light at intersection of Fourth and Main streets. Granted.

Mr. E. Price submitted the tax roll for the construction of a dam east of the parkway to the city council. Committed to the committee on franchises.

Mr. A. French asked that the money paid by him by mistake for a police's license be refunded. Granted.

E. N. Green asked to be appointed to the committee on water pumping Committee on sewers.

E. W. Taylor asked that a certain bridge over the sulfur canal on section 10, township 1 north, range 1 be removed. Committed to the committee on irrigation.

Mary Gilmore asked permission to pay special water tax by monthly installments in as much as she was too poor to pay the entire amount at once. Approved.

George Robinson asked a release on mercantile license. Committed to the mayor.

The Salt Lake Rapid Transit Company asked to construct, maintain and operate a single or double track railway track on Fifth West street, between Second and Third South streets, without connection with existing track and railroads. Committed on streets.

The Grand Western Railway Company, superintendent, Wiley asked that the rate of tax be granted. Committed on streets.

F. G. C. Hansen asked for a rebate on mercantile license. Tabled. No. 10.

THE ALLEGED TAXI-KY RUBBISH.

The following communication from W. H. Ross was read and referred back to the committee on irrigation with instructions to more thoroughly investigate and report additional findings to the City Council.
