WATERWORKS UNDER RESTRAINT

A Temporary Injunction Granted By Court, Which is Asked to Be Made Permanent.

BOWMAN WINS FROM CITY.

Press Club Board of Governors Meet—Auditorium for State Teachers' Banquet.

Ogden, Utah, Dec. 13.—The complaint brought by J. J. Brummitt and a number of other business men against the Ogden waterworks company and Ogden City was filed with the county clerk yesterday afternoon, and immediately afterwards Judge Howell issued a temporary restraining order enjoining the defendants from carrying out the recent franchise granted by the city council for a period of 50 years. The complaint has as one of its exhibits the ordinance passed by the city council granting to the waterworks company the franchise, and another exhibit is a copy of the waterworks company's contract. The plaintiffs ask that on the hearing of the case the court make the temporary order perpetual, and that the ordinance be declared void and the contract of no effect, and that the court make an order forever prohibiting the city from selling, giving away or in any way disposing of its water rights or any such rights that it may acquire.

THOMAS DAILEY SHOT

By Grace Davis Who Then Sent a Bullet Through Her Brain.

Nampa, Idaho, Dec. 13.—Thomas Dailey, a mill operative from Winslow, Ont., was shot in the abdomen and probably fatally wounded by Grace Davis, in a record here early today. The woman then killed herself, firing a bullet into her brain.

WILL TRY NEW FUEL.

Coal Shipping Necessitates Innovation—A Dangerous Situation.

Provo, Dec. 13.—The Provo Pressed Brick company, which made preparations to run all winter, but which may have to close down on account of lack of fuel, will first try to keep the works in operation by using coke screenings and wood to supplement the small amount of coal it can obtain. Manager Belmont has returned from a visit to the Utah Fuel company in Salt Lake, made to learn if it was not possible to get sufficient coal for his company. All he could receive assurance of getting was one car a week, and the suggestion was made that he try coke screenings. This he will do, and also use all the wood he can, as he is very anxious to continue operations, the company having sufficient orders for

brick to make it necessary to work all winter, if possible.

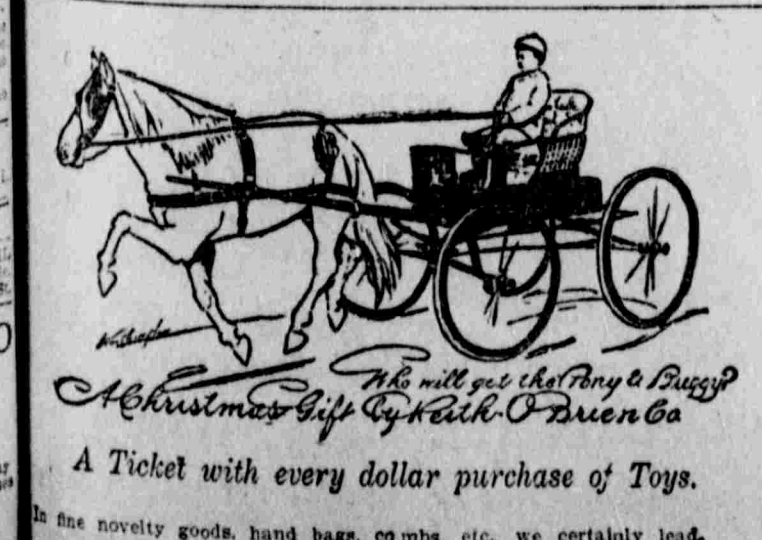

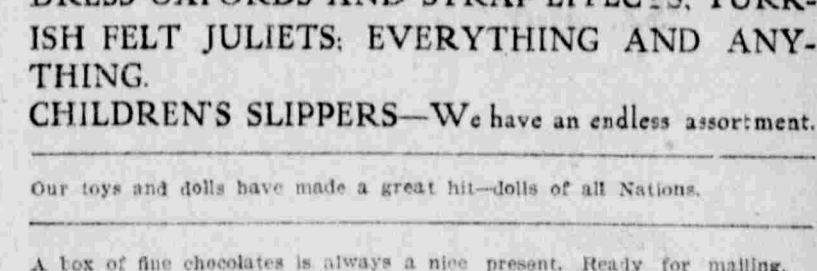
