But that may be found impracticable, unless there should be harmony and co-operation brought about between the several companies interested in our rallway affairs. However, a depot in this city will be necessary to the plans for the enterprise that has been undertaken, and which, we are assured, may be set down as something certain to be accomplished. Therefore some measures will have to be adopted to secure a site for this purpose, and the good-will and aid of our live citizns will doubtless be obthined.

The benefits to be derived from the building of the new line cannot fall to be perceived by the people of this city. The construction will mean sub-contracts and labor for many Utah men. The completion of the line will mean an outlet for supplies to markets at a distance, and the inflow of much business. and money. Think of the quick and direct connection with southern Callfornia and the coast, and with the towns and mines and regions to be opened to settlement and range on the WRY!

The people of Los Angeles are alive to the situation, and have invested a million dollars in the enterprise. Salt Lake must not close its eyes to the advantages to be obtained. Whatever can be done ought to be done readily, to further the movement.

This is no baseless speculation. It is a well-founded reality. The men and the money are both ready to push benefits from the great scheme which are beyond present computation. We welcome the good news, and hope soon to see the dirt fly and the rails extended to connect Salt Lake with the lovely "City of the Angels."
