Mobilization of Fifty Thousand In. dian Troops. ALLAHABAD, 24. — Earl Dufferin, Viceroy, met here to-day Gen. Sir Donald Stewart, commander-in-chief of the forces in India. The iviceroy sanctioned the mobilization of two army corps of 25,000 men each, which are to be sent to Pishin with a reserve of 10,000 men. Gen. Stewart will have supreme command, while Gen. Sir Frederick Roberts will command one army corps and Gen. Hardings the other. The Duke of Connaught will be given one of the divisional commands.

Supplies for six months are being sent to Pishin.
General Stewart has started for
Rawaul-Pendi to mature his plans.
Earl Dufferin will start for Rawaul-Pendi to-morrow.

It is expected the whole force will advance at the conclusion of the meeting of Dufferin and the Ameer.

among them arises, out of the fact of the educated Hindoos being almost ex-clusively patronized by the Indian thoverament, in the filling of the nu-merous offices from members of that obsequious and pliable class of persons, who obtain salaries ranging from 30 rupees per month and upwards as writer, stipendary magistrates, asalstant commissioners, etc. .
As far as my observations extended there did not appear any just grounds for serious complaint, as most of the Mahomedans are able to obtain a comfortable living; but what makes them feel sore is, that the Europeans

are living in IDLENESS AND LUXURY, as the natives think, on the fat of their land. But if they would call to mind the terrible oppressions they have groaned under during the reign of the native rulers it certainly would have a tendency to reconcile them to their

Although thousands of tracts were distributed among the Europeans, and I and associate missionaries preached many times in the open air to numer-que sudiences and enjoyed the advantage of inserting many communications in the leading newspepers, there was no response from any of the Europeans, who took no kind of notice of our ef-forts to win them to the truth; and as for the

MINISTERS OF RELIGION, they made use of all the usual modes for poisoning the minds of the people, and succeeded to the fullest extent, as not a single person was baptized during our four months' active operations in Calcutta.




