CONTRACT FOR RETAINING WALLS.

The board of public works reported that it had entered into a contract with William Harkins for the construction of retaining walls in the reservoirs at Parley's Canyon. Report adopted and contract confirmed.

COST OF CLEANING CANAL.

Watermaster Harvey reported that in the matter of the expense of cleaning and repairing the Jordan and Salt Lake canal that \$508.75 had been expended thus far this year. Committee on irrigation.

HE WANTS INSTRUCTION.

The city attorney submitted a lengthy report in which he stated:

The recorder informs me that the assessor and collector of this city had reported to your honorable body a list of unpaid taxes, among which were the taxes due from Zion's Building and Loan Association; that the same was referred to me to prepare papers and commence suit against said association. I beg leave to return the same to your honorable body for further instruction.

Received and filed.

The Mayor—The only thing that can be done in this class of cases is to instruct the assessor to distress such property until the taxes on it are paid.

The City Attorney—But the property can't be found.

The Mayor—Then the taxes can't be collected.

WITHOUT PAY.

At the request of G. W. Carter and others, James E. Barker was made a special policeman without pay from the city.

NOTHING TO RESIGN FROM.

The committee on police reported as follows in the matter of the resignation of Hugh L. Glenn as mounted policeman: We find that he was not holding such office at the date of the tender, therefore he had no such position to resign from. We recommend that the Council take no action in the matter. Adopted.

REFERRED TO THE WATERMASTER.

In the matter of the appointment of a watchman at the aqueduct at Parley's canyon, the committee on police recommended that the matter be referred to the watermaster. Adopted.

IN THE CENTER OF THE STREET.

The committee on streets recommended that the permanent tracks of the Rapid Transit Railway Company on State street at First, Second and Third South, should be in the center of the street and that the engineer be instructed to notify the company accordingly. Adopted.

LICENSE MATTERS.

The committee on licenses recommended that a liquor license be issued to W. A. Pitt, Luce and Berryman, J. Y. Smith, Peter H. Green and S. B. Newman. Adopted.

That the petition of A. C. Bixen for a rebate on liquor license be not granted. Adopted.

BAD ICE.

The board of health and the sanitary committee submitted a report on the ice ponds north of Agricultural Park, reported that the ice made there was

hardly fit for domestic uses, although it might do for refrigerators. Stables were in too close proximity, and there was no question but the filth seeped into the pond. They thought the public should be apprised of the fact. Adopted.

FIFTY DOLLARS FOR A HORSE.

The committee on claims reported favorably on the claim of Thomas F. Matthews for \$50; value of a horse killed in Parley's canyon. Adopted.

SPRINKLING CONTRACT LET.

The committee on sprinkling recommended that the bid of Mount & Griffin for sprinkling the streets of the city be accepted and a contract made for two years' service. Adopted. The firm agrees to sprinkle two hundred and seventeen block at \$3.12 per block or \$17,603 per season or \$2,933.84 per month.

On a vote being taken Folland and Moran cast their ballots against the adoption of the report, being opposed to granting a contract for two years.

All of the rest of the members cast their votes in favor of the report which was accordingly adopted and referred to the city attorney to draw up the contract, and authority given to the Mayor to execute the same.

THE MURRAY FRANCHISE

Came up, but on motion of Wantland went over until Colonel Murray should return from the east with money enough to build the road.

SEWER ORDINANCE.

An ordinance extending the boundary lines of Sewer District No. 1 was passed under a suspension of the rules.

NEW PAVING DISTRICTS.

An ordinance to create paving districts Nos. 7, 8 and 9, which was laid on the table last Friday night, was taken up and passed under a suspension of the rules.

The streets comprised in the several districts are: South Temple, from State to West Temple; First South, from State to Second East; Second and Third South, from State to Second East; First South, from West Temple to First West, Market street and Franklin avenue.

SUCCEEDS DOGGETT.

A communication was received from B. K. Bloch, asking that P. L. Johnson be appointed as policeman. On recommendation of the Mayor and marshal he was appointed to succeed Doggett, the removed policeman. Action confirmed.

THE CHANGING OF NAMES OF STREETS.

Simondi offered a resolution, which was adopted, which provided that the recorder be instructed to transmit a copy of the report previously read from the board of public works to the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce with a request that that organization appoint a committee of five to confer with a committee from the Council and board of public works in the matter of changing the names of streets.

Evans offered the following resolution:

That the watermaster and supervisor of streets be authorized to construct and place in position a flume on Second South street between Seventh and Eighth West street, in accordance with plans and estimates furnished by the city engineer. Adopted.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Loofbourrow offered a resolution requiring all the standing committees to meet every Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock, after which an adjournment was taken until Friday night at 7:30.

An adjourned session of the City Council was held Friday night, Mayor Baskin presiding. The following councilmen were in attendance: Folland, Hardy, Horn, Bell, Wantland, Evans, Loofbourrow, Beardsley, Lawson, Moran, Heiss, Ewing, Simondi. Absent—Karrick, Rich.

After the minutes of Tuesday night's session had been read, amended and approved, business was transacted as follows:

MISCELLANEOUS.

Wantland offered the following:

That the city engineer furnish estimates of costs of sidewalks (flagging and asphaltum) also cost of paving with asphaltum on Market street.

Adopted.

SUNDAY SHAVING.

Ewing was responsible for the following:

Resolved, That the proprietors of such barber shops as may be located in a hotel or in the basement of a hotel, be authorized in so far as the city government may be able to authorize them to keep their shops open from 8 to 11 o'clock a. m. on Sunday for the purpose only of shaving guests of the hotels and transient persons stopping temporarily in the city.

Moran moved to refer to the city attorney with a request that that official report at the next meeting as to the legality of the resolution.

Wantland said that this was folly as the city attorney's opinion on the matter was already well known.

Ewing said that he was in favor of the resolution as he knew it would be a great accommodation to hotel guests. As an illustration he called attention to the Presbyterian excursionists who were due in this city on Saturday midnight of even date; they would want to be shaved on Sunday. The barbers generally opposed Sunday shaving simply because they were lazy.

Moran arose to reply when Simondi called him to order, saying that he had already spoken too often.

Loofbourrow said that the custom of shaving on Sunday prevailed throughout the cities of the United States generally, and if our city was made an exception to the rule it would not meet with the approbation of tourists. When we were in Rome we should follow the customs of Romans.

Folland said he was opposed to any
