#### PARLOR IN J. A. CUNNINGHAM'S RESIDENCE.

The above cut shows the parlor in the residence of J. A. Cunningham, on First street. The house has a tiled entrance hall, with double doors opening into the large hall in which are a staircase, and mantle in alcove effect.

The parlor opens on the south, its elaborate mantel, done in ebony and gold, and picturesque window, lined with a cushioned seat with a grill design in gilt underneath, being two very attractive features of the room.
